Resurrection

Resurrection in a nutshell is bringing back to life. The synonyms for resurrection are: reappearance, rebirth, restoration, resurgence, revival, reawakening and return to life. So, we see it does not only apply to bringing back a person to life.

From a religious concept, it is used in two distinct respects: (1) belief in the resurrection of individual souls that is current and ongoing, and (2) belief in a singular resurrection of the dead at the end of the world.

The death and resurrection of Jesus is the central focus of Christianity. There is also the scientific examples of people dying, pronounced clinically dead and then life is restored to them. This is called the "Lazarus syndrome."

Resurrection from the Latin noun "resurrection-onis" and the verb "rego" means to make straight, to rise up, get up and stand up.

In Christianity, resurrection most critically concerns:

- 1. Resurrection of Jesus He was raised from the dead, ascended to God the Father to return as the Messiah (1 Thessalonians 1:10).
- 2. Resurrection of Judgment Day The dead in Christ shall arise (1 Thessalonians 4:16).

While most people, especially Christians, focus on Resurrection as a human body that is dead coming back to life, let us look at resurrection in other areas of our lives. We can experience resurrection in:

- Marriages
- Finances
- Jobs
- Family
- Health
- Our Spiritual Walk

Any situation in our lives that seems dead can be resurrected by fasting and prayer, Matthew 21:22, "And all things you ask in prayer, believing, you will receive." You need to ask God in prayer, praying according to His will and praying in faith.


(Resurrection cont'd)

When you think your marriage is ending, don't just give up and run to the nearest attorney, commit the situation to God, ask Him for direction, trust God to resurrect the desire for each other and see how he comes through for you. Same concept applies to Finances, Jobs, Family and Health. I will walk you through - Spiritual Walk.

When you reach the point where you don't want to fellowship with the saints, you don't want to pray or go to church, you have become spiritually dead. For God to resurrect you spiritually, you have to make sacrifices. Start with playing worship songs, play them until it becomes a habit. Sing along with the songs; at some point you will not remember the words but the music will still be bursting in you. Make up your own words, tell God you love Him; tell Him how good and awesome He is. Pretty soon your song will become worship and praise. Things will start happening within you. The pruning process has now started and old things and habits are being cut away for the new life to increase in you. You will soon start praying and praising until you can't wait for Wednesdays to come around to go to Bible Study and Sundays for church and Sunday School.

We have to learn to praise our way out of dead situations for Resurrection to take place.




HYMN OF THE MONTH: "GLORY TO HIS NAME"

This hymn, "Glory to His Name" is also called "Down at the Cross" and was written by Elisha A. Hoffman in 1878. The lyrics came to him while he was reading about the Crucifixion of Jesus in the Bible and that set him to thinking about how God saved men from their sins by allowing Jesus to die on the cross. It was originally written as a poem and later set to music by John Stockton who was a musician and a member of the church Hoffman attended.

Born on May 7, 1839 in Orwigsburg, Pennsylvania, Hoffman was a Presbyterian minister and composer of over 2,000 hymns and editor of over 50 song books. He was also the son of an Evangelical minister so he was no stranger to singing hymns and bible studies. He furthered his education at Union Seminary in New Berlin, Pennsylvania, and was, subsequently, ordained as a Presbyterian minister in 1873. Minister Hoffman died in 1929 in Chicago, Illinois, and was buried there in Oak Woods Cemetery.



These lyrics were based on the scriptural passage of Matthew 26:28, "For this is my blood of the new testament, which is shed for many for the remission of sins."

LYRICS 1. Down at the cross where my Savior died, Down where for cleansing from sin I cried, There to my heart was the blood applied; Glory to His Name! Refrain: Glory to His Name, Glory to His Name: There to my heart was the blood applied; Glory to His Name 2. I am so wondrously saved from sin, Jesus so sweetly abides within, There at the cross where He took me in; Glory to His Name! 3. Oh, precious fountain that saves from sin, I am so glad I have entered in; There Jesus saves me and keeps me clean; Glory to His Name! 4. Come to this fountain so rich and sweet. Cast thy poor soul at the Savior's feet; Plunge in today, and be made complete; Glory to His Name!

REVIVAL AT SPRINGFIELD MISSIONARY BAPTIST CHURCH

Springfield Baptist Church had their annual three nights of revival services Wednesday, March 20th through Friday, March 22nd. Our own Pastor Ronald Lee Bowens was the guest speaker for all three nights of services.

Wednesday night started out with his message coming from Mark 5:1-14 and was titled, "The Jumping of Tombstone Demons." The message was about the demon possessed man who lived among the tombs. He had a legion of demons in him, but when Satan tries to conquer us, Jesus restores us. The possessed man fell at Jesus' feet and the demon begged him to be cast into the swine. Even the demons have to tremble at Jesus' name.

Thursday night's message came from 1 Kings 21:1-5 and this message was titled, "Deal or No Deal." It tells of Naboth's refusal to sell his vineyard to Ahab because there are some things you cannot put a value on. There are things that need to pass from generation to generation, not only material things, but morals and principles.

Friday night was Friendship Night as the revival came to a close. The Friendship family was invited to fellowship and was well represented. It was like Sunday Service at Friendship in Duluth, with a few visitors which was the Springfield family. All roads led us to Lula, Georgia as we piled into two buses, carpools and solo drivers. There were Friendship Ministers, Deacons, Ushers, the Choir and congregation.

Our Deacons conducted the devotion including scripture and prayer. Springfield's congregational hymn was sung, "I Surrender All." Friendship's Choir sang a selection before Pastor Bowens brought the message, which came from Mark 10:17-20 and was titled "You Have a License to Praise the Lord."

In a nutshell, the message was about our reason to Praise God because we are saved. The points to ponder were: 1) **Eternal Salvation**, 2) **Eternal Security** and 3) **Eternal Satisfaction**.

- 1) **Eternal Salvation** This is the benefit of a new relationship with God:
 - Renewal Some things are made new.
 - Reward God rewards us both now and when we go home to him for the work we do on earth.
 - Rescue We will be taken up in rapture before the great tribulation.
- 2) <u>Eternal Security</u> We are saved forever. Our name is written in Heaven and will not be blotted out from the Lamb's Book of Life. We are kept by the Power of God, saved and kept by Grace. Because we are saved forever does not mean we have a license to sin.
- 3) <u>Eternal Satisfaction</u> Again, we are reminded, your name is written in the Lamb's Book of Life. To be absent from the body is to be present with the Lord. We will be going to a place where there will be no more tears, hurts, crying, sin, sickness, pain, curse or death. God will be there with His people surrounded by Jasper walls and Pearly Gates, streets of Gold and Angelic Hosts.



Friendship Baptist Church Usher's Anniversary Celebration was on Sunday, March 24th at 3:00 p.m. in the main sanctuary. The ushers marched in with flair and pizzazz as they rocked their brand new gray usher's attire with white baby breath and purple flower corsages. The men had matching boutonnieres minus the silver ribbon.

The Grand Entrance of the Ushers, utilizing all three aisles and rocking to the song "When I Rose This Morning," much to the amusement of the congregation, received Pastor's nod of approval as he was also totally amazed and tickled at our comical entry.





Our emcee of the hour was our own Sis. Temeka Ramsey. The choir rendered selections of "One More Day," "God is an Awesome God, He is Greatly to be Praised" and "We Offer the Sacrifice of Praise" before Pastor Bowens introduced the speaker of the hour, Dr. William F. Sherman of Mt. Carmel Baptist Church in Clearwater, FL.

There are two things we should have in our service to God:

- 1. The Instrument of Faith Without Faith it is impossible to please God. Proverbs 3:5-6, Trust in the Lord with all thine heart and lean not to thine own understanding. In all thy ways acknowledge Him, and He shall direct thy paths.
- 2. The Instrument of the Word of God We are not dedicated to God by reading his word continuously and studying His word—we need to get into the Word so the Word can get into us. Reference was made to Psalm 23:3b; "He leadeth me in the paths of righteousness for His name's sake." The Law of the Lord is Perfect, so we should strive for Excellence in God's Word.























HEALTH MINISTRY - National Autism Awareness Month

Autism spectrum disorder (ASD) is a complex developmental disability; signs typically appear during early childhood and affect a person's ability to communicate, and interact with others. ASD is defined by a certain set of behaviors and is a "spectrum condition" that affects individuals differently and to varying degrees. There is no known single cause of autism, but increased awareness and early diagnosis/intervention and access to appropriate services/supports lead to significantly improved outcomes. Some of the behaviors associated with autism include delayed learning of language; difficulty making eye contact or holding a conversation; difficulty with executive functioning, which relates to reasoning and planning; narrow, intense interests; poor motor skills' and sensory sensitivities. Again, a person on the

spectrum might follow many of these behaviors or just a few, or many others besides. The diagnosis of autism spectrum disorder is applied based on analysis of all behaviors and their severity.

In 2018, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention issued their ADDM autism prevalence report. The report concluded that the prevalence of autism had risen to 1 in every 59 births in the United States – twice as great as the 2004 rate of 1 in 125 – and almost 1 in 54 boys. The spotlight shining on autism as a result has opened opportunities for the nation to consider how to serve families facing a lifetime of supports for the individual with autism. In June 2014, researchers estimated the lifetime cost of caring for an individual with autism is as great as \$2.4 million. The Autism Society estimates that the United States is facing almost \$90 billion annually in costs for autism. (This figure includes research, insurance costs and non-covered expenses, Medicaid waivers for autism, educational spending, housing, transportation, employment, related therapeutic services and caregiver costs.)

Learn the signs: Early identification can change lives

Autism is treatable. Individuals with autism do not "outgrow" autism, but studies show that early diagnosis and intervention lead to significantly improved outcomes. For more information on developmental milestones, visit the CDC's "Learn the Signs. Act Early" site. Here are some signs to look for:

- Lack of or delay in spoken language
- Repetitive use of language and/or motor mannerisms (e.g., hand-flapping, twirling objects)
- Little or no eye contact
- Lack of interest in peer relationships
- Lack of spontaneous or make-believe play
- Persistent fixation on parts of objects

Glory to God in the highest!
The theme for March was "Removing the Mask."



The women came together on Friday, March 8th to share in a surprise activity: the painting of masks. They chatted excitedly as each painted her mask in an array of colors and decorative flowers and jewels. It was a joyous occasion and each sister seemed pleased with the results. After displaying the masks and taking photos of each, we departed for the evening only to return the following Saturday for our regular monthly meeting.

Seventeen masks were displayed to showcase the activity for those who weren't able to attend the evening before. "Oohs and ahhs were uttered as attendees viewed the display.

During our meeting, three scriptures were read by the following sisters as a way of setting the tone for the gathering:

Gertie Brock:

<u>2 Corinthians 5:17</u>: "Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation; old things have passed away; behold, all things have become new."

Linda Berry:

<u>2 Corinthians 3:18</u>: "But we all, with open face beholding as in a glass the glory of the LORD, are changed into the same image from glory to glory, even as by the Spirit of the LORD."

Geraldine Powell:

<u>1 Peter 2:9</u>: "But you are a chosen people, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God's special possession, that you may declare the praises of him who called you out of darkness into his wonderful light."

We selected the song, "Holy Spirit" by Kim Walker-Smith to welcome His presence.

In adhering to our normal customs, **Harriett Hairston** welcomed three 1st time attendees: Rosetta Garnett, Maria Love and Brenda Steverson. The ministry also acknowledged birthday and anniversary celebrants. Following these acknowledgements, **Cheryl Alford** asked the women to assist in preparing for our April meeting by providing an anonymous question that would be addressed at that time. **Vickie Chambers** led the women in the reading of our Covenant followed by **Kelly Wilson** who offered a moving mime interpretation to "Secrets" by Israel and Adrienne Houghton.

As we continued in our fellowship, **Gerri Wright** shared a reading entitled, "The Onion" (author unknown) which spoke about how our Heavenly Father peels away the many layers of sin in our lives so that He can get to our core and begin to make us who He wants us to be. Our take away from this is that once He cleans us to the core, we can determine that "We won't go back". To emphasize this point, our resident music technician, **Dranita Morrow**, played "I Won't Go Back" by William McDowell.

It was now the moment we'd been waiting for. Newly licensed **Minister Monique Stroman** shared a few words of encouragement on the importance of not hiding behind the mask. **Harriett Hairston**, ministry secretary, was able to capture several points made during her presentation: There may be more than one thing hiding behind the mask (but we have the Word to draw from in these moments):

- 1. <u>The Mask of Expectancy</u>: Feeling different and sensitive, comparing ourselves to others. We may hear several positive expressions yet we hold on to that one negative. Though the devil starts early to bring negativity, we must remember Jeremiah 1:5: "Before I formed thee in the belly I knew thee; and before thou camest forth out of the womb I sanctified thee, and I ordained thee a prophet unto the nations."
- 2. The Mask of Fear: We say "I'm ok" even though we may not feel that way. Psalm 27:1: "The Lord is my light and my salvation; whom shall I fear? The Lord is the strength of my life; of whom shall I be afraid?" Deuteronomy 30:20 tells us God's promises help to overcome fear; and Jeremiah 29:11 says, "For I know the plans I have for you," declares the LORD, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future."

Min. Monique reminded the women that "death" brings about pain, but we can call on the Lord for help. She supported further comments with the following verses:

Psalm 143:7: "Hear me speedily, O Lord: my spirit faileth: hide not thy face from me, lest I be like unto them that go down into the pit." Psalm 118:14: "The Lord is my strength and song and is become my salvation." Isaiah 61:3: "To appoint unto them that morn in Zion, to give unto them beauty for ashes the oil of joy for mourning, the garment of praise for the spirit of heaviness; that they might be called trees of righteousness, the planting of the Lord, that He might be glorified."

Finally, as we grow in God's word, we begin to relate to the Word as we see ourselves. We can share with others when we're free. "If the Son, therefore, shall make you free, ye shall be free indeed" John 8:36.

At the end of her presentation, we were uplifted with a rendition of "Your Love" by William Murphy after which all ladies were asked to remove the mask and discard them in the trash as a symbolic expression of being delivered from hiding behind our fears, etc.

After being spiritually enlightened, the ladies shared in a light breakfast followed by a final reading by **Mother Pat Ashe** entitled, "How We See Ourselves." It was based on one of our opening scriptures, 2 Corinthians 3:18 and a reminder that we must learn to see ourselves as God sees us.

At the end of this reading, we were reminded that

"When we, in true humility, see ourselves perfect as He sees us, then we will reflect to the world the One who is more desirable than any other. Don't be confined to who you think you are <u>but</u> expand into the limitless potential of who God has made you to be." In the end, "Your story will reveal His glory!"

We invite you to join us each month as we strive to walk together in one band of Christian love and unity and as we continue to encourage one another in strengthening our faith.



Sharing a story from "Inside Chick-fil-A" to encourage, inspire and motivate our young people. It doesn't matter where you come from or where you live—what matters are the choices you make for your life. Here is one young lady's story:

Growing up in Nigeria, against the backdrop of an unstable political climate, Adaobi Gwacham's parents dreamt of a new life for their five children.

"Nigeria was different and difficult, but it was all we knew. We made the best of it," says Gwacham.

Dreams finally gave way to reality when the Gwacham family won a visa lottery in 1999 and moved to the U.S., settling into the town of Chino Hills, Calif. With little money and a different culture to navigate, they began their new life.



"I was studying to be a nurse. But I loved my job at Chick-fil-A so much that it turned into a dream to own my own Chick-fil-A. That's when I changed my major to business," says Gwacham.

After graduating from California Baptist University, Gwacham took on new assignments with Chick-fil-A. She traveled across the country to work on grand openings, but always kept dreaming and working towards her ultimate goal of becoming a Chick-fil-A Operator.

Finally, the opportunity came along in 2014 when she became the franchise owner of the Chick-fil-A at E. Colorado Blvd. in Pasadena, CA.

"It was surreal for probably the first six months that I actually accomplished my goal. All my hard work actually paid off," says Gwacham. "But the best part was that I made my parents proud."

Gwacham, the first in her family to graduate from high school and college, sees her business as an opportunity to impact the lives of her team members and serve her community. She teaches personal budgeting classes for her restaurant team members, many of whom have never had a savings account. She recently began offering a 401k to eligible employees. Not surprisingly, Gwacham has a low turnover rate among her employees.

"I know what it's like to struggle, and I want things to be different for my team members. I want to create a family in my restaurant. They may not always work for me, but while they are here, I will take care of them and make sure their needs are met. I will help them think about their futures," says Gwacham.

Gwacham channels that passion for young people into her community as well. She speaks monthly to local schools to share her experiences, in hopes that it will inspire teenagers to chase their dreams.


"I tell them that anyone can achieve their goals. You just have to put in the work and get your education, no matter who you are."



Distracted Driving Awareness Month!



- Call or message someone else when I know they are driving






Booker T. Washington was one of the leading figures in the charge to educate freed slaves during the reconstruction era. Being a free slave himself, he believed that the key to African Americans' future success was through learning practical skills. Though his emphasis on manual skills as the ticket to advancement for his race drew criticism from those favoring a more balanced education for African Americans, it's evident that his approach was perhaps better suited to the American social climate of its time. But Booker T. Washington's ceaseless, pioneering efforts helped to ease white America into a greater acceptance of their fellow Americans.

George Washington Carver too was inexorably linked with slavery (his parents were former slaves,) and like Washington, did not let that fact keep him down. He was quite intelligent, and after a boyhood growing up learning about plants and botany, he pursued that field in higher education. He eventually graduated with a B.S. from the Iowa State College of Agriculture in 1894. He used this degree to great effect, discovering numerous uses for peanuts, soybeans, and sweet potatoes; crops that were once considered worthless. His research helped many farmers in the South deal with problems such as soil depletion and the boll weevil, which destroyed the cotton industry.
