Survive by the dictionary explanations are: to live, remain alive, sustain oneself, cling to life, pull through, get through, hold on, keep body and soul together, continue, remain, persist, endure, persevere, abide, carry, stay around, linger, exist.

In other words, survive can be capped as:

- Continue to live or exist in spite of an accident or ordeal
- Remain alive after near death or death of a loved one
- Manage to keep going despite difficult times or circumstances.

Survival and Preparedness is like a flourishing marriage, they go hand in hand. To survive you need to have a sense of preparedness. The Bible gives us many lessons on survival. God gave Noah instructions to build the ark. Noah didn't wait for the rains to come before he started building. He listened to God and followed his instructions. When the floods came, Noah was safely locked away in the ark with his family and the animals. He had enough food and water for all on the ark to survive until God gave additional instructions. (Genesis 6:21 "And take thou unto thee of all food that is eaten, and thou shalt gather it to thee; and it shall be for food for thee and for them.")

How many times we know there is a leak in the roof or window and don't do anything about it until the rainy season sets in, then we scramble about trying to fix it. We know we are in hurricane season; how many of us has stocked up on water, batteries, flash lights, non-perishable food items, etc.

When we go on a trip we should be prepared for the "what ifs". Research where you are going to see if there is a history of kidnapping, terrorism, etc. Some trips need special inoculations. Some countries you have to carry ample supply of medication, food and water, especially if your diet vastly differs from where you are heading. (Proverbs 27:12 "A prudent man foreseeth the evil, and hideth himself, but the simple pass on and are punished.")

During a crisis, most likely, we can survive a short-term set back, but what if there was a long-term disaster? Severe damage from the elements like hurricanes, tornadoes, etc. Can we exercise self discipline not to gorge ourselves of the food supply we have on hand but know how to ration wisely so we have another day to look forward to? (Proverbs 21:20 "The wise store up choice food and olive oil, but fools gulp theirs down.")



Are we spiritually ready to survive what the enemy throws at us? We have to be strong and stand strong in the Faith. We need to stand firm on God's word, so when the enemy tries to put one over on us we can discern what he's trying to do. So many times employers, politicians and even churches try to brain wash us on morals and ethics, but if we know the Word of God, we cannot fall for just anything because we know what we stand for and whose Word we stand on. (1 Corinthians 16:13 "Be on the alert, stand firm in the faith, act like men, be strong.")

Society also tries to push us down when we stand for what is right. With immoral living and worldly passions, we are often frowned upon when we don't participate, but the Bible tells us to be alert and be ready for the very real evils that are out there. (1 Thessalonians 5:6 "Therefore let us not sleep, as others do, but let us watch and be sober.")

HYMN OF THE MONTH:

Leaning on the Everlasting Arms"

THE HISTORY

This song was written and composed in a joint effort by Elisha Hoffman and Anthony J. Showalter.

The author of the verses of this song was Elisha Hoffman who was born on May 7, 1839, in Pennsylvania. He graduated from Union Seminary in Pennsylvania and was ordained in 1868. As a minister he was appointed to the circuit in Napoleon, Ohio in 1872. He worked with the Evangelical Association publishing arm in Cleveland OH for eleven years. He served in many chapels and churches in Cleveland and in Grafton in 1880s. In his lifetime he wrote more than 2,000 gospel songs including "Leaning on the Everlasting Arms" in 1894 and edited 50 song books. He passed away in 1929.

The composer of the music and the chorus was written by Anthony J. Showalter, who, in response to letters to two friends that had lost their wives, his expression of sympathy was the verse from Deuteronomy 33:27. After writing the chorus, he collaborated with Elisha Hoffman to write the verses for the song and it was first published in 1887 in, "The Glad Evangel for Revival, Camp, and Evangelistic Meetings, for which Showalter was an editor.

This Hymn was inspired by Deuteronomy 33:27, "The Eternal God is thy refuge, and underneath are the everlasting arms". Please meditate on this hymn as it is sung, think of what it means to find refuge in our Heavenly Father's arms in times of fears and trials and allow God's peace and joy to replace our fears, unbelief and anxieties.

THE SONG

1 What a fellowship, what a joy divine, leaning on the everlasting arms; what a blessedness, what a peace is mine, leaning on the everlasting arms.

leaning, leaning,
leaning on the everlasting arms.

TEACH THEM A LESSON

We want them to quit exploiting us... So we put them where they exploit each other...

We want them to take control of their own lives, own their own problems, and quit being a parasite... So we make them so totally dependent on us...



Childhood Cancer Facts: 10 Things You Should Know About Childhood Cancer by St. Baldrick's Foundation

- 1. Childhood cancer is the number one disease killer of children in the U.S. Cancer is the leading disease-related cause of death for children and adolescents ages 1-19, and 1 in 264 children and adolescents will develop cancer before the age of 20.
- 2. Every two minutes a child is diagnosed with cancer. That's 300,000 kids around the world every year.



- 3. The average age of a child diagnosed with cancer is 6. But you don't have to be a child to be diagnosed with childhood cancer. Childhood cancers are diagnosed in all ages, from newborn infants to children and young adults.
- 4. 80% of children diagnosed with cancer are in developing countries. Childhood cancer is a global problem.
- 5. The most common childhood cancer is acute lymphoblastic leukemia (ALL). In the 1950s, almost every kid with ALL died. But today, thanks to childhood cancer research, about 90% of children with the most common form of ALL will survive. There are still types of ALL that have far lower survival rates.
- 6. In 80% of kids with cancer, the cancer has already spread to other areas of the body by the time it is diagnosed. That's why so many children with cancer need to begin treatment right away. Many adult cancers can be diagnosed early.
- 7. Much of what we know about treating adult cancers has been learned from childhood cancer research. Some aspects of cancer treatment today, such as combination chemotherapy, can be traced to pediatric cancer research.
- 8. There are over a dozen types of childhood cancer and hundreds of different subtypes. The more rare types, when added together, account for about 30% of cancers in children and adolescents. But because so few children are diagnosed with each type, it's very difficult to do research on these cancers.
- 9. One in five children diagnosed with cancer in the U.S. will not survive. For the ones who do, the battle is never over.
- 10. Because of the treatments they had as kids, more than 99% of childhood cancer survivors have a chronic health problem and 96% have severe or life-threatening conditions. By the time they're 50 years old, survivors of childhood cancer experience about 5 severe or life-threatening chronic health conditions on average.





The setting included five round tables with one word for each and at least 5-6 women at each table. They were encouraged to discuss their assigned word, provide a definition, scriptural references and a summary of the discussion to be shared with the body as a whole.

Following is a brief summary of what each table shared:

Fact 1... Forgiveness ... Min. Jada Redman The act of pardoning an offender. Scriptures: 1 John 1:9; Colossians 3:13; Ephesians 1:16-23. We must admit our own mistakes in order to be forgiven.

Fact 2...Adoration ...Diane Russell A deep love, respect, worship, glorify, praise. Scriptures: Psalm 45:5 (praise); Psalm 89:7 (reverence); Matthew 21:37 (respect); Isaiah 17:7 (respect). Adoration is the opportunity to worship God for who He is.

Fact 3... <u>Confession</u> ... Debbie Chambers A formal statement admitting that one is guilty, i.e., owning up to it. Scriptures: James 5:16. It's important and necessary that we confess our sins before a merciful God who will forgive us. Proverbs 23:13; Proverbs 32:5.

Fact 4... Thanksgiving ... Harriett Hairston Showing/telling God how we feel about what He has done. Scriptures: Psalm 46:1; 1 Thessalonians 5:18. We are to give thanks in all things. There is giving in thanksgiving. When we praise God and offer prayer to Him, He gives us power which puts us in a thanksgiving mode.

Fact 5... **Supplication** ... Mother Gerald Baker Plead humbly for something. Scriptures: Philippians 4:6; Matthew 6. Before asking God for something, seek *forgiveness*, *adore* His awesomeness, *confess* your sins and *thank* Him for His blessings.








BLACK HISTORY FACTS

Fact #1: As a child <u>Muhammad Ali</u> was refused an autograph by his boxing idol, <u>Sugar Ray Robinson</u>. When Ali became a prizefighter, he vowed never to deny an autograph request, which he honored throughout his career.

Fact #2: Muhammad Ali, the self-proclaimed "greatest [boxer] of all time," was originally named after his father, who was named after the 19th-century abolitionist and politician Cassius Marcellus Clay.

Fact #3: Allensworth is the first all-black Californian township, founded and financed by African Americans. Created by <u>Lieutenant Colonel Allen Allensworth</u> in 1908, the town was built with the intention of establishing a self-sufficient city where African Americans could live their lives free of racial prejudice.

Fact #4: Jazz, an African–American musical form born out of the blues, ragtime and marching bands, originated in Louisiana during the turn of the 19th century. The word "jazz" is a slang term that at one point referred to a sexual act.

Fact #5: During the 1930s, painter Charles Alston founded the 306 group, which convened in his studio space and provided support and apprenticeship for African-American artists, including <u>Langston Hughes</u>; sculptor Augusta Savage; and mixed-media visionary Romare Bearden.


Fact #6: Before <u>Wally Amos</u> became famous for his "Famous Amos" chocolate chip cookies, he was a talent agent at the William Morris Agency, where he worked with the likes of The Supremes and Simon & Garfunkel.

Fact #7: Martin Luther King, Jr. was assassinated on friend Maya Angelou's birthday, on April 4, 1968. Angelou stopped celebrating her birthday for years afterward, and sent flowers to King's widow, Coretta Scott King, for more than 30 years, until Coretta's death in 2006.

Fact #8: Louis Armstrong learned how to play the cornet while living at the Colored Waif's Home for Boys.

Fact #9: Musician <u>Louis Armstrong</u> earned the nickname "<u>Satchmo</u>" which was a shortened version of the moniker "satchel mouth."

Fact #10: After a long career as an actress and singer, <u>Pearl Bailey</u> earned a bachelor's degree in theology from Georgetown University in 1985.


