# The Birth of

Jesus' birth was prophesied hundreds of years before his birth in the Old Testament around 1500-1300 BC. In Genesis 22, after Abraham took his son Isaac to be sacrificed. God intervened with a ram in the bush for the sacrifice. The Angel of the Lord spoke to Abraham out of the Heavens and gave him many promises of blessings, one of which in verse 18 is "And in thy seed shall all nations of the earth be blessed; because thou hast obeyed my voice."

Another prophesy came in the book of Numbers between 1446-1260 BC in Chapter 24, when Balaam listened to God and started blessing Israel, it was spoken in verse 17, "I shall see him, but not now; I shall behold him, but not nigh; there shall come a Star out of Jacob, and a Sceptre shall rise out of Israel...". Both these prophesies were fulfilled in Matthew 1:1-17 and Luke 3:23-38.

The Virgin birth was prophesied in 740 BC in Isaiah 7:14, "Therefore the Lord himself shall give you a sign; behold, a Virgin shall conceive, and bear a Son, and shall call his name Immanuel" (God with us). This was fulfilled in Matthew 1:20-25 and Luke 1:26-35.

Jesus had to come to us as the Incarnate, meaning becoming flesh. He was God in human form, He was here from the beginning of the world as seen in John 1:1, "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God." To relate to man, He had to come in the form of a baby, growing up as a child, rubbing shoulders with us, showing us He was not better than us because of his great Love for us.

In Luke Chapter 1, Gabriel, the Angel of the Lord, appeared to Mary and told her of her upcoming task, being the mother of Jesus and His responsibilities:

- 1. He was to be called Jesus (vs. 31).
- 2. He will be great and be called the Son of the Most High (vs. 32).
- 3. God will give Him the throne of David (vs. 32).
- 4. There will be no end of His kingdom (vs. 33).
- 5. He will be called Holy, the Son of God (vs. 35).

Gabriel gave Mary the assurance that these things will surely take place because, "With God, nothing shall be Impossible" (vs. 37).

As we celebrate the holidays with traditional things like Christmas carols, Christmas trees, decorations and gifts, let us focus on the real reason of the season. God wrapped his Son in his Love, entrusted him to Mary for a season and gave us the chance of eternal life through Christ Jesus.

He's no longer the little baby in the manger but the Risen King who gave his life at Calvary's cross for our sins. He adopted us in His royal priesthood and made us joint-heirs with him in Glory. We should remember the great Love God gave us in His Son and emulate such love by giving and sharing with those who are less fortunate. Let us celebrate Christ, the reason for the season.

## **HYMN OF THE MONTH**

## "Joy to the World"







"Joy to the World" is a popular Christmas carol that came out of a collaboration of three people: Isaac Watts (1674-1748), George Frederic Handel (1685-1759) and Lowell Mason (1792-1872).

This song could be considered the most unlikely Christmas hymn because first, it is based from Psalm 98 instead of the Christmas narrative in Luke 2 and, secondly, it celebrates Christ's second coming more than his first.

Isaac Watts was an English poet and a clergyman who challenged many teachings of the Orthodox church. He paraphrased the entire Psalm 98 in two parts, and it first appeared in his famous collection, "The Psalms of David, Imitated in the Language of the New Testament 1719."

"Joy to the World" was taken from the second part of the paraphrase of Psalm 98:4-9, entitled, "The Messiah's Coming and Kingdom." In commenting on his paraphrase, in his own words, Mr. Watts said, "In these two hymns I have formed out of the 98<sup>th</sup> Psalm, I have fully expressed what I esteem to be the first and chief Sense of the Holy Scriptures."

Verse 3 of the hymn is sometimes omitted because it was not based on Psalm 98: "No more let sins and sorrows grow, nor thorns infest the ground; He comes to make his blessings flow, far as the curse is found." This "curse" is a reference to Genesis 3:17 when Adam and Eve sinned in the garden of Eden.

George Handel was from Germany residing in London and Lowell Mason was from Boston USA. After all three composers collaborated and put their spin on this song, it resulted in a favorite Christmas hymn based on an Old Testament psalm, set to musical fragments composed in England and pieced together across the Atlantic in the United States of America.



## SIGNS OF THE SEASON

# Christmas - Christ's mass

The name 'Christmas' comes from the Mass of Christ (or Jesus). A Mass service (which is sometimes called Communion or Eucharist) is where Christians remember that Jesus died for us and then came back to life.

<u>The First Christmas</u> - The first Christmas celebration by the early Christian Church occurred 331 years after Christ's Crucifixion in Jerusalem. The church didn't celebrate the birth of Christ until the third century because no one knew the date. The date of the birth of Christ is not recorded in the Bible. It wasn't likely that shepherds were watching their flocks in the middle of a Northern Hemisphere winter. They were more likely to be doing this in the warmer months. Nonetheless, the actual date of Jesus' birth remains a mystery. The first recorded date of Christmas being celebrated on December 25th was in 336 AD in Rome; the date sanctioned by Pope Julius. This corresponds to the date of the solstice on the Roman calendar.

Some people think that December 25<sup>th</sup> might have also been chosen because the Winter Solstice and the ancient pagan Roman midwinter festivals called <u>'Saturnalia'</u> (https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Saturnalia) and <u>'Dies Natalis Solis Invicti'</u> (https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Sol Invictus#Festival of Dies Natalis Solis Invicti) took place in December around this date so it was a time when people were already celebrating.

<u>The Tradition of Advent</u> - Advent is the period of four Sundays and weeks before Christmas or sometimes from December 1<sup>st</sup> to Christmas Day. Advent means 'Coming' in Latin (the coming of Jesus into the world.) Christians use the four Sundays and weeks of Advent to prepare and remember the real meaning of Christmas. The four weeks of Advent are themed; each represented by a candle placed in the Advent Wreath. The wreath symbolizes God's unending love and the eternal life He makes possible!

1st Sunday: Hope (or promise)

2nd Sunday: Preparation (waiting or prophecy)

3rd Sunday: Joy (peace)

4th Sunday: Love (adoration)

The Friendship Baptist Church Youth Department has made a tradition of celebrating Advent each Sunday in December with our youth. It is a spiritual time where the children participate around the altar commemorating and anticipating the coming of the birth of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ!

<u>Conclusion</u> - The celebratory traditions associated around the world with Christmas have a mix of pre-Christian, Christian, and secular themes and origins. Popular modern-day customs of the holiday include gift giving, completing an Advent calendar, singing Christmas music and caroling. Fellowshipping, feasting, spending time with family and friends and helping those less fortunate are all Christ-like ways to live out our faith in Jesus! Although there's no Biblical or historical proof that Jesus was born on December 25<sup>th</sup> the Blessing is, **He was born!** 

John 1 (KJV): ¹In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God... ¹⁴And the Word was made flesh, and dwelt among us, (and we beheld his glory, the glory as of the only begotten of the Father), full of grace and truth. For Christians, this is absolutely worth celebrating!

### Mind, Body and Soul

Getting proper food, rest and exercise are part of the basic routine to follow to keep your body fit and healthy. 





# THE HISTORY OF WATCH NIGHT SERVICES DECEMBER 31




Watch Night church services originated within Moravian communities. During these gatherings, the pastor would begin a sermon just before midnight, never intending to finish. Instead, when the church bells rang in the new day, congregants would interrupt the sermon, either by singing or walking out of the church. This practice was meant to remind participants that Jesus could return at any moment and that the faithful must be ever ready for his arrival. These midnight services gained popularity outside of Moravian churches when John Wesley adopted them. The first Methodist Watch Night services were held in England during the full moon, when attendees would be sure to have enough light for their late-night walk home, and they became popular in the American colonies shortly after the first were celebrated in Philadelphia and New York in November of 1770. Though they began as monthly celebrations, by the nineteenth century, these regular meetings declined in popularity among Methodists, while the New Year's Eve services became particularly popular as an alternative to the rowdy celebrations that had come to characterize this secular holiday.

Although the Watch Night ceremony began within Moravian and Methodist churches, it is perhaps most popular today within evangelical Protestant churches, especially African American denominations and congregations. This is because the Watch Night service has an additional significance within many African American religious communities. Sometimes referred to as Freedom's Eve ceremonies, church services in many black churches not only mark the beginning of a new year and a fresh start, but also commemorate the end of American slavery.



In 1862, Abraham Lincoln issued the Preliminary Emancipation Proclamation, which read "on the first day of January...all persons held as slaves within any State, or designated part of a State, the people whereof shall then be in rebellion against the United States shall be then, thenceforward, and forever free." Although the proclamation was issued in September, Lincoln promised to sign the document on the first day of the new year, thereby declaring the freedom of all the slaves in any Confederate states that had refused to rejoin the Union. On December 31, 1862, enslaved and free people gathered in churches and hush harbors throughout the divided country in anticipation. One popular story tells of a man in Boston running into the Tremont Temple Baptist Church just before midnight announcing that freedom was coming to the South. Although slaveholders in Confederate states obviously did not recognize Lincoln's authority to issue such an order, nor was there any way for Union forces to enact such a decree, the proclamation was nonetheless symbolically significant and has therefore been remembered in innumerable African American churches every year since.

In addition to commemorating the events of 1863, congregants in African American churches gather for many of the same reasons that early Methodists had. Watch Night services provide a religious way to celebrate an otherwise secular holiday that is often characterized by drunken revelry. Churchgoers gather in the late evening and hold services until the dawn of the new year in order to contemplate the previous year and evaluate their choices. They also think ahead to the coming year, make resolutions, and renew their commitment to God. Prayers are said, songs sung, and sermons given, and in some cases the Emancipation Proclamation is read.

Although Watch Night services have traditionally taken on an additional historical significance within African American religious communities, this additional meaning is becoming increasingly less known. Many African American church celebrations today are indistinguishable from European Watch Night celebrations and no longer include any reference to Freedom's Eve. This has led some ministers to question whether they should continue to celebrate the event. New Year's Eve is not, after all, generally thought of as a religious holiday, and as the particular African American historical and cultural significance becomes less commonly understood, some have chosen to abandon the practice all together. Nonetheless, the Watch Night ceremony remains significant in many African American churches, and the tradition is likely to continue for many years to come.






