The secular meaning of Faith by the English Dictionary is considered as complete trust or confidence in someone or something. The words that back up this statement are: Trust, Belief, Confidence, Conviction, Credence, Reliance, Dependence, Optimism, Hopefulness and Expectation.

Faith is also considered as a strong belief in God or in the doctrines of a religion, based on spiritual apprehension rather than proof. Supporting words can be termed as: Religion, Church, Sect, Denomination, Persuasion, Belief, Ideology, Creed, Teaching, Dogma and Doctrine.

People of Faith refers to any person who can be delineated or classified by an adherence to a religious tradition or doctrine, as opposed to those who do not publicly identify or in any way espouse a religious path.

Faith is belief in someone or something beyond ourselves. So, to a Christian, it is a belief in God, Jesus and the Holy Spirit. We cannot see God but yet we believe in Him. Belief is centered in Faith, thus it can be said that belief is the subset of Faith. On the other hand, Faith can be equated to evidence, whereas belief cannot be equated with evidence but can be considered as a substitute for knowledge.

Faith in God means that you trust God with your life more than you trust yourself. It means that you trust his timing even when you are running out of patience. It means that you trust His decisions even if you don't like them. It means that you will love Him with all your heart even when you don't understand Him.

Our Faith should be unwavering, so in times when we tend to question God, we still believe in Him. When we are tired of the trials and tests, we can be rest assured that He knows what He is doing, so instead of fighting with God, we fight for Him and instead of complaining of things going wrong we thank Him for walking us through it.

Faith doesn't change anything around us but it changes everything within us. Faith helps us to live through pain and darkness. It keeps us going when others are giving up. It gives us hope and teaches us the meaning of life and how to maintain a godly lifestyle.

Faith is not seeing God but knowing He's there, it's not hearing Him but knowing He's listening and doing what is best for us. We are reminded in Hebrews 11:1, "Now Faith is the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen".

Faith is the means by which we receive those things we hope for. Neither is faith sight. Faith is the evidence of things not seen. Faith can only operate in the realm of the invisible concerning those things we hope for and do not yet see. Faith cannot exist in the visible realm.



"But without faith it is impossible to please him: for he that cometh to God must believe that he is, and that he is a rewarder of them that diligently seek him." Hebrews 11:6


# **HYMN OF THE MONTH - "THE SOLID ROCK"**

This song was written by Edward Mote and the tune composed by William B Bradbury in 1863. Edward Mote was born in Upper Thames, London on January 21, 1797. He underwent a great spiritual change through the preaching of Rev. J. Hyatt of Tottenham Court Road Chapel, and ultimately became a Baptist minister. He was a Pastor at

Horsham, Sussex, for the last 26 years of his life and he died on November 13, 1874. Mr. Mote published



**HYMN HISTORY**: Sometimes the grace of God penetrates into unlikely places. Edward Mote's parents were hostile to religion, but while still a boy Edward became a Christian through the influence of a cabinetmaker to whom he was apprenticed. As a man, he became a skilled cabinetmaker with a successful business of his own.

Regardless of the claims of his business on his time, Mote always found time to worship God. He was especially interested in Christian music, and one day felt inspired on the way to work to write down a verse that came to his mind. Before the day was finished, he had completed four verses. His new hymn began with the words, "My hope is built on nothing less than Jesus' blood and righteousness."

Not long thereafter, Mote visited a friend whose wife was ill. It was a Sunday, and the friend mentioned that he and his wife liked to observe Sunday by singing a hymn, reading a scripture, and having prayer together. Mote had a copy of his hymn in his pocket, so they sang it. The friend's wife was so taken with the hymn that she requested a copy for herself. Encouraged by her interest, Mote had copies printed -- and soon found himself the author of a beloved hymn.

My hope is built on nothing less than Jesus' blood and righteousness; I dare not trust the sweetest frame, but wholly lean on Jesus' name.


# Chorus:



This will be a Day of Service for the Outreach Ministry as we restock our FBC Food Pantry.


The MLK Jr. Breakfast Program will begin at 10:00 am in the Family Life Center.

# **HEALTH MINISTRY - Glaucoma Awareness Month**



Glaucoma is a leading cause of vision loss and blindness in the United States. People are often unaware that glaucoma has no symptoms in its early stages. If detected early, before noticeable vision loss occurs, glaucoma can usually be controlled and severe vision loss can often be prevented. Vision that is lost from glaucoma cannot be restored.

# FIVE GLAUCOMA GUIDELINES TO REMEMBER:


- 1. More patients than ever. Over 3 million people in the U.S. have glaucoma, and the number is rising.
- 2. Glaucoma can affect people of all ages. Although generally associated with seniors, glaucoma can strike anyone since each person has their own level of eye pressure tolerance.
- 3. Demographics do play a role. Glaucoma is a leading cause of blindness among African Americans; it's also highly prevalent in Hispanics over the age 65.
- 4. Is glaucoma hereditary? The risk of developing primary open–angle glaucoma is up to nine times more likely if parents or siblings have the disease.
- 5. Hope for future glaucoma patients. Although there is no cure for any form of glaucoma, early diagnosis and treatment help control the disease and slow the process of vision loss or blindness.



# **EDUCATION MINISTRY**

Knowing that the world is becoming increasingly dangerous for all, but especially for women, the Education Ministry offered a Self Defense Program, RAD, free of charge.



RAD, Rape Aggression Defense, was taught by Officer Parker of the Gwinnett County Police Department. This class was designed for women to offer realistic self-defense tactics and techniques. RAD's objective is to provide options of self-defense and repeating and practicing the options so that they become viable considerations to the woman who might be attacked. This class taught the students to be aware of their surroundings, yell when feeling threatened, and totally engage (fight) when needed.

Officer Parker was a great instructor who worked with the group to ensure that everyone attending felt comfortable and empowered to defend themselves if ever put in a compromising situation where self-defense would be necessary.

Pastor Bowens preached the Word from Job 1:6-22 KJV to a packed house on New Year's Eve. The sermon topic was "The Invisible War." He shared that there is conflict all around us like sickness, death, pain, sorrow, trouble, but there is an area of conflict that goes on around us that we cannot and do not see. We are all engaged in spiritual warfare. We forget that God sees all, nothing escapes Him, and He has a plan for each one of us just as He had for Job.

# ➤ An Unlikely Candidate (v. 1-5)

Job was a man of purity, holiness and someone who walked in integrity. He was wealthy and righteous and blessed. Job was not a part-time believer. He lived this way every day. He lived out his relationship with God. Just because we are doing the right thing doesn't mean trouble won't come. Sometimes God sends suffering to test and grow us. Job suffered for the glory of God. We are more likely to suffer and be attacked when we stand tall for the Lord.

# ➤ An Unseen Conflict (v. 6-12)

The angels give an account of their service to God. While we are living down here on earth doing what we do, there is a conflict going on in the atmosphere. The one wreaking havoc is called by many names-- Satan, Lucifer, the liar, a deceiver and an accuser of the brethren.

- ➤ An Unbelievable Crisis (v. 7-19)
  - Satan released hell in Job's life. All 10 of Job's children died in one day. He lost his livestock, his land, everything. As long as you don't lose Jesus, you have everything you need, and as long as you walk with God, He can be glorified in your crisis. Satan's attempt is to rob God of His Glory so he gets busy in our lives, too.
- An <u>Unfazed Commitment</u> (v. 20-22)

  No matter what all you go through, don't stop worshipping God. Stay committed to Him.

This ministry was established by Pastor Bowens in 2004 to help satisfy a need for fellowship due to a progressive growth in the presence of women.

Over the years, several women served as leaders beginning with Min. Denise Harvey (Jackson) and Evg. Karen DeLee. These two faithful sisters served the ministry until 2007. Activities included a "Secret Sisters Brunch," and A Mothers' Gala. Teaming up with them for the latter event was the Mothers Ministry.

In 2006, Pastor Bowens placed the annual Women's Day under the auspices of the ministry. At the time, Andrian Oldham was chairperson and the two ministries worked together to host a retreat in Asheville, NC. After serving for three years, Evg. Denise resigned and the ministry became inactive until 2009 when Sis. Venda Young and Sis. Diana McGhee were appointed to lead as Chair and Co-Chair.

During their tenure, the Annual Women's Day was still active and led by Sis. LaRahn Walden and Sis. Pamela Crenshaw. While Sis. Diana served only during 2009, Venda and new assistant, Sis. Yvette Leverett continued to serve until 2011. Highlights included a roundtable discussion, celebration of Mother Geneva Burse's 75th birthday, a Mother/Daughter brunch, a Widows' luncheon spearheaded by Min. Leslie Green and a Women's' Retreat.

In 2012, Min. Roslyn Long began serving as Chairperson. Assisting her were Sis. Yvette Leverett, 2012-13, and Sis. Vickie Chambers, 2014-16. Highlights during Min. Long's tenure included a Teen summit, a study on "Women Growing in the Fruit of the Spirit," A "Word Up" conference, a fashion show and a study of women in the Bible. The women who shared in this event donned attire in assimilated fashion to what was worn during that period as they shared an interpretation of those women being represented. Also, The Creative Learning Workshop was established by Sis. Sharon Wilson and Sis. Pat Malone.

In 2017, Vickie assumed responsibility as Servant Leader with Min. Nicole Walker as assistant. A study of two books was done: Having a Mary's Heart in a Martha World and The Full Armor of God. Other highlights during her tenure included "Hatitude," Christmas in July (hosted by Creative Learning), the honoring of those women who had reached the age of 75+ and a weekend trip to the Holy Land Experience in Orlando Florida.

In 2019, with the approval of Pastor Bowens, Sis. Cheryl Alford became Servant Leader and Sis. Geralyn (Gerry) Wright, Assistant Leader. Prior to Sis. Cheryl assuming the leadership role, Sis. Vickie Chambers had been praying about what to share going forward. She and Sis. Cheryl had a discussion at which time Sis. Cheryl provided several ideas. Vickie chose one of them to be presented at the beginning of the year. However, Sis. Vickie was reassigned to head the Shepherd's Care Ministry so Cheryl followed through and introduced it to the ministry. The activity was a two-day event entitled, "Removing the Mask." Another highlight of the year was the Panel Discussion which actually took three months to complete and was thoroughly enjoyed by all. It's important to note that Creative Learning became an independent ministry during 2019. And there you have it!

It's 2020! Sisters Cheryl Alford, Gerry Wright, Geraldine Powell, Shirley Price, Harriett Hairston, Linda Berry and Mothers Pat Ashe and Shirley Thomas are our leaders. We are determined to serve you faithfully throughout the year, so please continue to pray for this ministry as we endeavor to do that which The Lord has placed on our hearts and pray that the women of Friendship will be blessed and that more of you will desire to come out and unite with us as we walk by faith, looking only unto Jesus to guide and direct us.

Our mothers would get new recipes by copying them down from books and magazines they found in the library. A school term paper typically meant hours at the library pouring through card catalogs and stacks of books. **Digital technology, virtual libraries, and various apps give us access to instant news alerts and other information 24/7 without leaving home.** 

**Educational technology and e-learning are becoming more popular by the day.** Students are able to take courses online thanks to technology that allows them

to upload homework and interact with fellow students and teachers through chat rooms and online forums. Online education has also made it very simple for students to receive personal attention from qualified teachers, and for the parents to track academic progress of their children online. Parents are also benefiting from online learning that makes it easier for working adults to pursue college degrees.

The digital age is even changing many aspects of the traditional classroom. **Teachers are able to use computers,** projectors, and specialized whiteboards with touch screens to make lessons more engaging and interactive for students.

# 4. Development

What may appear to you as mindless screen time may actually contribute to your child's mental and social development:

- Video games require a great deal of manual dexterity and may increase your youngster's hand/eye coordination.
- A number of apps and computer games are available to **enhance reading and phonics skills or even help your child learn a second language**.
- E-books and online libraries can **expose your child to new worlds and encourage a life-long love of reading**.

- Various apps and games can help your child learn numbers, shapes, or improve their skills in more advanced mathematics.
- Blogs, websites, and social media sites can **help your child develop social skills** by allowing them to communicate easily with family and peers from all different backgrounds and cultures.

- Technology can make your child more prepared for school. Not only do apps and games teach basic skills like reading and math, but they also teach high-level skills such as problem-solving, strategy, and critical thinking that are essential to academic success.
- Gaming teaches kids skills such as focusing and paying attention to detail. These skills can help them both in school and later in life.
- Most games and apps require the user to successfully complete one level before being allowed to move on to the next. This can help teach your child the value of persistence, competition, and motivation.
- Technology **encourages children to broaden their horizons**. Many kids discover an interest in a subject such as history or geography through an online video or game and go on to do research into the subject.
- Technology can **help your child discover hidden skills and creative talents**. The Internet is a forum for many forms of self-expression such as writing, video, and music. By exposing your child early on to the many possibilities available with today's digital technology, your child may develop interests and talents that lead them to their future career.

# 5. Entertainment

Our favorite music, television shows, movies, or games are available at our fingertips through streaming services and **mobile apps.** The vast array of entertainment selections can even help bridge generation gaps within families. You can bond with your teen over a favorite movie from when you were their age or try your hand at their favorite game.

If you are not a major technology buff, you may feel a little intimidated about using some of the gadgets and gizmos that seem so easy for the younger

generation. Here are some tips that may make going digital a little easier:

- You can **try using a tablet to play online games with your kids**. Tablets are more portable than laptops and kids typically prefer them over other mobile devices.
- **Look for games that you feel are fun and age-appropriate**, and make a point of learning them together with your child.
- Make it a point to play games with your kids more often. For example, you can **try scheduling a weekly** family tournament surrounding their favorite game.
- Remember to be patient, and be willing to allow your child to be the teacher. Letting your youngster share their expertise can be a huge confidence booster.

Final Word: As parents, we tend to be very concerned about the negative aspects of technology. Of course, there are certain risks involved in sharing our lives online that young children and teens may not fully understand.

That is where we, as parents, must educate and guide our children.



# Who was Edmonia Lewis?

**Edmonia Lewis**, in full **Mary Edmonia Lewis**, (born *c.* July 4, 1844, Greenbush, N.Y., U.S.—died Sept. 17, 1907, London, England), American sculptor whose Neoclassical works exploring religious and classical themes won contemporary praise and received renewed interest in the late 20th century.

Lewis was the daughter of an African American man and a woman of African and Ojibwa (Chippewa) descent. She was orphaned at a young age and afterward reportedly lived with her maternal aunts among the Ojibwa, who called her Wildfire. With the help of an older brother, she obtained admission to the preparatory department of Oberlin College in 1859, and from 1860 to 1863 she attended the college proper.



Lewis thrived at Oberlin, excelling particularly at drawing, but she left in 1863 after having been accused both of poisoning two of her classmates in 1862 and of theft in 1863. A mob beat her severely before her trial for accusations of poisoning; she was later acquitted, with the help of lawyer John Mercer Langston. Again with her brother's support, she made her way to Boston, where abolitionist William Lloyd Garrison introduced her to a local sculptor, from whom she received a few lessons in modeling.

Lewis's first work seen publicly was a medallion, advertised for sale early in 1864, that featured the head of militant abolitionist John Brown. Later in the year her bust of Col. Robert Gould Shaw (a Boston hero who had been killed leading his black troops in the attack on Fort Wagner, part of the assault on Charleston, S.C.) was widely praised. Sales of copies of the bust allowed her to sail in 1865 to Rome, where Charlotte Cushman, Harriet Hosmer, and other members of the American art community took her under their wing. Lewis mastered working in marble and refused to hire Italian stone carvers to transfer her plaster models to marble, in order to quell any question that the work was her own.

Lewis quickly achieved success as a sculptor. Inspired by the Emancipation Proclamation, she carved *The Freed Woman and Her Child* (1866) and *Forever Free* (1867). She subsequently turned to Native American themes and created *The Marriage of Hiawatha* (*c.* 1868) and *The Old Arrow Maker and His Daughter* (more than one version), both based on the narrative poem *The Song of Hiawatha* (1855) by Henry Wadsworth Longfellow, of whom she carved more than one bust. Her other notable works include busts of Garrison (*c.* 1866) and Abraham Lincoln (*c.* 1871) and *Hygeia* (*c.* 1871), a grave-site statue that was commissioned by Harriot K. Hunt.

Lewis also depicted biblical figures, such as *Hagar* (more than one version). Her career reached its peak in 1876 when her sculpture *The Death of Cleopatra* was exhibited at the Philadelphia Centennial Exposition. In 1883 she received her last major commission, a version of the *Adoration of the Magi*, from a church in Baltimore, Md. It was variously reported that Lewis had last been seen in Rome in 1909 or 1911, but death records discovered in the early 21st century show that she died in London in 1907.

Lewis recently became the subject of a Google Doodle that pictures her working on *The Death of* Cleopatra. Also, the New York Times featured her on July 25, 2018 in its "Overlooked

No More" series of obituaries written about women and minorities whose lives had been ignored by newspapers because of the cultural prejudice that revered white men.
















# **National Black Anthem**
