Resurrection in a nutshell is bringing back to life. The synonyms for resurrection are: reappearance, rebirth, restoration, resurgence, revival, reawakening and return to life. So, we see it does not only apply to bringing a person back to life.

From a religious concept, it is used in two distinct respects: (1) belief in the resurrection of individual souls that is current and ongoing, and (2) belief in a singular resurrection of the dead at the end of the world.

The death and resurrection of Jesus is the central focus of Christianity. There is also the scientific examples of people dying, pronounced clinically dead and then life is restored to them. This is called the "Lazarus syndrome."

Resurrection from the Latin noun "resurrection-onis" and the verb "rego" means to make straight, to rise up, get up and stand up.

In Christianity, resurrection most critically concerns:

- 1. Resurrection of Jesus He was raised from the dead, ascended to God the Father to return as the Messiah (1 Thessalonians 1:10).
- 2. Resurrection of Judgment Day The dead in Christ shall arise (1 Thessalonians 4:16).

While most people, especially Christians, focus on Resurrection as a human body that is dead coming back to life, let us look at resurrection in other areas of our lives. We can experience resurrection in:

- Marriages
- Finances
- Jobs

- Family
- Health
- Our Spiritual Walk

Any situation in our lives that seems dead can be resurrected by fasting and prayer, Matthew 21:22, "And all things you ask in prayer, believing, you will receive." You need to ask God in prayer, praying according to His will and praying in faith.

When you think your marriage is ending, don't just give up and run to the nearest attorney, commit the situation to God, ask Him for direction, trust God to resurrect the desire for each other and see how he comes through for you. Same concept applies to Finances, Jobs, Family and Health. I will walk you through - Spiritual Walk.

When you reach the point where you don't want to fellowship with the saints, you don't want to pray or go to church, you have become spiritually dead. For God to resurrect you spiritually, you have to make sacrifices. Start with playing worship songs, play them until it becomes a habit. Sing along with the songs; at some point you will not remember the words but the music will still be bursting in you. Make up your own words, tell God you love Him; tell Him how good and awesome He is. Pretty soon your song will become worship and praise. Things will start happening within you. The pruning process has now started and old things and habits are being cut away for the new life to increase in you. You will soon start praying and praising until you can't wait for Wednesdays to come around to go to Bible Study and Sundays for church and Sunday School.

We have to learn to praise our way out of dead situations for Resurrection to take place.




HYMN OF THE MONTH: "GLORY TO HIS NAME"

This hymn, "Glory to His Name" is also called "Down at the Cross" and was written by Elisha A. Hoffman in 1878. The lyrics came to him while he was reading about the Crucifixion of Jesus in the Bible and that set him to thinking about how God saved men from their sins by allowing Jesus to die on the cross. It was originally written as a poem and later set to music by John Stockton who was a musician and a member of the church Hoffman attended.

Born on May 7, 1839 in Orwigsburg, Pennsylvania, Hoffman was a Presbyterian minister and composer of over 2,000 hymns and editor of over 50 song books. He was also the son of an Evangelical minister so he was no stranger to singing hymns and bible studies. He furthered his education at Union Seminary in New Berlin, Pennsylvania, and was, subsequently, ordained as a Presbyterian minister in 1873. Minister Hoffman died in 1929 in Chicago, Illinois, and was buried there in Oak Woods Cemetery.



These lyrics were based on the scriptural passage of Matthew 26:28, "For this is my blood of the new testament, which is shed for many for the remission of sins."

LYRICS 1. Down at the cross where my Savior died, Down where for cleansing from sin I cried. There to my heart was the blood applied; Glory to His Name! Refrain: Glory to His Name, Glory to His Name: There to my heart was the blood applied; Glory to His Name 2. I am so wondrously saved from sin, Jesus so sweetly abides within, There at the cross where He took me in; Glory to His Name! Oh, precious fountain that saves from sin, I am so glad I have entered in; There Jesus saves me and keeps me clean; Glory to His Name! 4. Come to this fountain so rich and sweet, Cast thy poor soul at the Savior's feet; Plunge in today, and be made complete; Glory to His Name!

As the coronavirus pandemic continues during this spring season, my husband and I decided to tackle the yard as well as till a new vegetable garden area now that we both are retired. Thank goodness we live in a small neighborhood of 35 homes with no homeowner's association! If there was one, we would have paid a hefty fine for the way the yard was neglected for much too long, but with my husband's crazy work schedule at the time and my schedule, the yard became less of a priority and more of a burden and was the worse it had ever been in our 20 years living here! I decided to go bigger and plant seeds this time, lots of seeds--the majority of them planted in the ground and many in pots! I was so overwhelmed even after I thought I had read enough and journaled enough to know which plants to plant together and which ones to keep them away from... what herbs to plant with them also to keep the aphids and caterpillars away. Some seeds, like squash and melons, were deliberately planted on hills but before I could get the other seeds in the ground, a rainstorm came and washed the dirt downhill so I had to mound up the dirt for planting the other vegetable seeds to keep them from being washed away by the next rainfall. Then I thought about the weeds that will come... well, that's another story.

I grew up in VA where we always had a garden. I loved being outside, making mud pies, walking barefoot or sleeping outside in make-shift tents. There is an old saying that you can take the girl out of the country but you can't take the country out of the girl—I still love playing in the dirt! I love watching flowers bloom and how my gardens grow. Just about every day I go out to water the ground and look for any signs of green coming up from the soil and to my delight I now see green peas and green beans, dill, basil, lettuce and radishes coming up. What joy I feel to see life emerging! Planting from seed surely teaches patience. It may take 60-90 days to harvest anything but what a harvest it will be!

Gardening is also my time in the presence of the Lord surrounded by his creation. Listening to the sweet songs and melodies of the birds, watching a chipmunk or squirrel scurrying here and there. I even uncovered while digging in my flower bed a tiny turtle no bigger than a half-dollar coin—which I'm saving for my grandson who likes to come over to collect worms and those lizard-looking creatures that change colors. Even the trees are something to watch as the wind causes them to bow down low as if to give praise to the Lord. When I look up to the sunny blue sky with no cloud in view or a starry sky at night, I can't help but think of the goodness of the Lord and how he blesses us with so much that we don't stop to take the time to appreciate, perhaps the shelter-in situation has given us cause to pause and take note as we abide in faith, grow in hope and bear one another up in the love of God.

Faith, hope and love is evident even in gardening.

FBC COMMUNICATIONS MINISTRY

The April 2020 issue of the Friendship Voice places the spotlight on the FBC Communications Ministry. Below is the Communications Ministry purpose:

The Communications Ministry provides effective communications designed to inform and inspire Friendship Baptist Church (FBC) family and friends. We use various modes of communications and technology platforms to expose the works of FBC ministries and the church as a whole. We strive to encourage FBC family and friends, believers and non-believers to become engaged, get connected and be followers of Jesus Christ.

In the past, the Communications Ministry was structured and operated to support much of the communications at the physical buildings located at 3375 Church Lane. The buildings are currently closed due to the shelter-in-place order and for the well-being of the congregation. Before the closing, the Communications Ministry covered in-person events, taking pictures, writing articles, etc. Pastor's sermon points, song lyrics and announcements were presented on the screens in the church sanctuary.



WILL LUCAS - MEDIA AND TECHNOLOGY ENTREPRENEUR



Will is the founder and CEO at **A William Lucas Company** (AWLCo) which is home to several media and technology related companies including Creadio: a brand marketing technology agency servicing nationally recognized brands since 2007. He's also one of the few young minority TEDx organizers in the United States, curating TEDxToledo.

Will hosts the OF10podcast which highlights prominent minorities in technology startups including founders, engineers, and managers from Pinterest, Dropbox, Snapchat, Facebook, and others. The podcast has been featured in iTunes. He is also the Brand Manager for Afrotech.com, the largest black tech

conference and digital platform in the world.

Lucas was named to the **University of Toledo Board of Trustees** by Governor John Kasich in February 2016. The governor also appointed Will to the **Ohio Casino Control Commission** in 2013 – to which he was re-appointed for a second four-year term in 2017, and the **Ohio Martin Luther King Jr. Commission**, which he currently serves as Chairman, in 2014. In 2019, Will was appointed to **InnovateOhio Executive Advisory Board** by Ohio Lieutenant Governor Jon Husted. He was appointed Co-Chair of President Obama's **Ohio Small Business Committee** in 2012.

He is a songwriter and is listed as a co-writer on the track "How 'Bout It", found on the second studio album, *Special Occasion*, from R&B artist Bobby Valentino. The album, certified Gold by the RIAA, has sold over 500,000 copies.

KIMBERLY BRYANT – FOUNDER OF BLACK GIRLS CODE



Kimberly Bryant was born January 14, 1967 and grew up in Memphis, Tennessee. She earned a degree in Electrical Engineering and minored in Computer Science at Vanderbilt University. Bryant focused her studies at Vanderbilt on high-voltage electronics, and early in her career, she was hired for jobs at Westinghouse Electric and DuPont. Later, Bryant would move from electrical companies to biotechnology and later to pharmaceutical companies, where she worked at Pfizer, Merck, and at Genentech and Novartis.

Bryant founded **Black Girls Code** after her daughter expressed an interest in learning computer programming, and none of the available courses in the Bay area were well-suited for her: mostly boys, and rarely had other African American girls attending. Having experienced isolation herself during her time studying and working, she wanted a better environment for her daughter. Bryant hopes that this endeavor will allow young girls, especially those from minorities, to remain involved in STEM and increase awareness within the field. African-American women make up less than 3% of the workforce in the tech industry and **Black Girls Code** fights to change and improve this percentage for the better.

Black Girls Code teaches computer programming to school-age girls in after-school and summer programs. The San Francisco-based non-profit organization has a goal of teaching one million black girls to code by 2040. The organization already has trained 3,000 girls in seven chapters in cities in the United States, and has one chapter in Johannesburg, South Africa, with plans to add chapters in eight more cities.

In August 2017 Bryant was involved with turning down a \$125,000 donation by Uber which she considered "disingenuous". The donation followed allegations of sexual harassment at Uber. Bryant also noted in her refusal, that Girls Who Code was offered ten times the amount that was offered to *Black Girls Code*. In February 2018 *Black Girls Code* partnered with Uber's competitor Lyft - as Bryant considered their values to be better aligned with her own.

In 2013, Bryant was recognized as a White House Champion of Change for Tech Inclusion. That same year, she was voted one of the 25 Most Influential African-Americans In Technology by *Business Insider*. Bryant was also awarded the Pahara-Aspen Education Fellowship.

In 2014, Bryant was the recipient of Smithsonian Magazine's American Ingenuity Award for Social Progress

In 2019, Bryant was one of 65 finalists across 13 categories to present their projects at the 22nd annual Interactive Innovation awards presented by KPMG.

In 2019, Bryant was presented the 2019 SXSW Interactive Festival Hall of Fame award.

AMOS WINBUSH III – FOUNDER OF CYBERSYNCHS



Company: Cybersynchs

Age: 26

Amos Winbush III's company synchs smart-phones with a secure database online so users can pull and store information from their devices. The company returned over \$5 million in revenue last year and the popularity is growing as corporations are using the system to pull information from mobile workers.

Amos Winbush III is an accomplished serial entrepreneur, inventor and author, having founded four influential global technology companies within an eight-year time frame.

CyberSynchs a patented revolutionary universal synchronization platform and Woez an on demand group activity management platform acquired in 2016.

Amos Winbush III seemed headed for pop stardom. Most of his family was in the music business, and in 2007 he was poised to keep the family tradition alive when he landed a record deal and released a series of singles, mashups of Europop and R&B. So how did Winbush wind up atop a hot new tech company? In the midst of a recording session, Winbush found that his iPhone had gone black, resulting in the loss of hundreds of valuable contacts. So he recruited two engineers on Craigslist and began work on **CyberSynchs**, which automatically backs up data on phones, computers, and mobile devices. It turns out that company building is as exciting as showbiz: Today, the New York City-based company has revenue of \$13.5 million, 15 employees, and more than 60 million users worldwide.

"I'm at a place where I am only hands on when I need to be hands on. But I still want to be involved."

Amos Winbush III, a Shreveport native and musician in New York City, watched his cell phone suddenly crash and all of his contacts disappear during a recording session in 2008.

Winbush, a onetime American Idol contestant, veered off his path in the music industry to launch **CyberSynchs** for technology to automatically back up data on computers, cell phones and other mobile devices.

"I'm driven by responsibility and my passions are for family, literacy, and increasing access to science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) for everyone, but specifically for African Americans. So my involvement had to let me remain true to those values," says Winbush, who won the 2010 Black Enterprise Innovator of the Year Award.

DOLL AVANT - FOUNDER & CEO OF AQUAGENUITY



Named to 2019 ForbesWomen, Doll Avant is an award-winning tech entrepreneur, a cum laude graduate of Harvard University, and a TEDx speaker.

As a data scientist and social impact strategist, Doll was honored with the global designation of "Google's Woman of Water" and featured on Google's home page for creating the "world's largest water database."

Doll is the Founder & CEO of Aquagenuity ("Where Water Meets Ingenuity"), which is headquartered in Doll's hometown of Atlanta. Aquagenuity has been recognized by Forbes, Google, NASA, Harvard Innovation Labs, the U.S. Department of Defense Security Innovation Network, and WIRED Magazine as the first in the world to use big data,


blockchain, and artificial intelligence to help consumers, corporations and smart cities answer the question: "What's In Your Water?" in real-time, in order to predict and prevent water-related public health crises. This award-winning data analytics platform helps users track local water quality in real time and monitor water's impact on health & sustainability.

Aquagenuity was selected by Coca-Cola's BridgeCommunity as one of only 10 startups globally to implement new technology with Fortune 100 companies like Coke, Cox Enterprises, and Porsche.

Doll was named a Global Impact Fellow by Singularity at NASA Research Park in Silicon Valley; she has also received awards for entrepreneurship and technology innovation from JP Morgan, UBS, and Jack Daniels.

Aquagenuity is launching the consumer app (which gives consumers real-time notifications on what's in their water and what to do about it) in partnership with the United Nations for World Water Day in March 2019.

The Presidential Primary Election

The COVID-19 emergency has pushed back the Presidential Primary election to May 19. Per the <u>Gwinnett Daily Post</u>, state officials were considering whether to send paper absentee ballots to all registered voters in Georgia. However, you can go ahead and order your own absentee ballot now if you want to and it will be mailed to the address on your current voter registration card.

Here's how to cast an absentee ballot: Fill out an application for an absentee ballot by contacting the Voter Registrations and Elections Division at 678-226-7210 to request an application by mail or fax. Georgia law gives you until the Friday before the election to cast your absentee ballot-- that would be Friday, May 15. Do not wait until the last minute to cast your absentee ballot by U.S. mail. You can submit your absentee ballot in person to the Voter Registrations and Elections Division at 455 Grayson Highway, Suite 200, Lawrenceville, GA 30046, send as an e-mail attachment to absentee@gwinnettcounty.com or fax to 678-226-7275. Should you have any questions about casting your absentee ballot or about any other election-related matters, call the Gwinnett County Voter Registrations and Elections Division at 678-226-7210.

MOROCCAN SPICED CARROTS WITH GROUND LAMB

If you like lamb, this is a great recipe to serve as a side dish for a small crowd or as a main course for 4 folks with a simple grain salad on the side (think rice or quinoa.)

I tried this recipe and I loved it! The flavor surprised me. Submitted by Sis. Paulette Tapp

PREP TIME: 15 MINUTES COOK TIME: 35 MINUTES SERVES: 4-6

Carrots

- 1 pound carrots, sliced in half lengthwise
- 1-2 tablespoons olive oil
- 1/2 teaspoon ground cumin
- 1/2 teaspoon paprika
- 1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- salt and pepper

Lamb

- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 1 bunch of scallions, minced (white and light green parts only, reserve the tops for garnish)
- 1 clove of garlic, minced
- 1 teaspoon ground coriander
- 1/2 teaspoon ground cumin
- 1/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon fine sea salt
- a few grinds black pepper
- 1 pound ground lamb

Yogurt Sauce

- 1 cup plain sheep's milk, goat's milk, or cow's milk yogurt
- 1 clove of garlic, minced
- 2 teaspoons fresh lemon juice
- 1/2 teaspoon fine sea salt
- 2 teaspoons extra virgin olive oil

Preparation

- Preheat the oven to 425F. Toss the carrots with the oil, spices, salt and pepper. Place in a single layer on a baking sheet and roast in the oven until lightly browned and tender. About 30 minutes. Toss the carrots halfway through cooking.
- Heat a large skillet over medium-high heat. Add the oil to the pan, swirl to coat. Add the scallions, garlic, coriander, cumin, cinnamon, salt, pepper, and lamb. Cook, stirring occasionally, until the lamb is cooked through, 5-7 minutes.
- Prepare the yogurt sauce by whisking together all the ingredients in a bowl.
- Spread a thin layer of the yogurt sauce onto four plates, top with the carrots and then top with a few spoonfuls of the lamb mixture. Sprinkle with minced scallion tops and serve.
