We often talk about hope in a type of wishful sense: "I hope you have a nice day." "Hope you have a relaxing vacation." "I hope I get the job." "I hope she says yes." "I hope I get the promotion." "I hope I don't get sick." There are many things we hope for in this life, some more probable to happen than others. However, the biblical concept of hope goes far beyond these earthly hopes. It is not mere wishful thinking, but something we have confidence will happen. Hebrews 11:1 says, "Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen."

The Christian's hope is grounded in the belief that there is more to life than what we can wish for in this world. The Christian hope is based on the resurrection of Jesus Christ and in God's promise to resurrect all who believe in Jesus (1 Corinthians 15:19-23). It is the hope of forgiveness of sins (Colossians 1:13-14). It is the hope of a heavenly home (Hebrews 11:16). It is the hope of a glorified body in which to live (Philippians 3:20-21; 2 Thessalonians 1:10) and the hope of a new earth on which to live (2 Peter 3:13). Most importantly, it is the hope to live in these new glorified bodies on a new earth in the very presence of God Himself for all eternity (Revelation 21:2-4)—eternal life and joy in the presence of God (Psalm 16:11). This is the hope of all true believers.

This Christian hope is not wishful thinking. We have been given promises by God Himself that Jesus Christ, whom He raised from the dead, will return again. We have been promised by God Himself that when Jesus returns, we who believe will be transformed into the perfect image and likeness of His Son (2 Corinthians 3:18; 1 John 3:2-3). We have been promised that we who believe will be forgiven our sins because of the death of Christ and will inherit eternal life because of the righteousness and resurrection of Christ (2 Corinthians 1:20; Titus 1:2). The resurrection is no myth. It was a historical event witnessed by hundreds of people. Jesus Christ rose from the dead and appeared to His disciples and at least 500 other people (1 Corinthians 15:3-8). After forty days, Jesus ascended to heaven where He reigns at God's right hand (Acts 1:3; Ephesians 1:20). He will come again to judge the living and the dead (Acts 10:42). In this we hope, and we have good reason to hope, for God has said it will be and God accomplishes everything He says (Hebrews 10:23; 1 Corinthians 1:9). He has done so throughout history and will continue to do so in the future.

As further assurance, God has given His Holy Spirit to believers in Christ (2 Corinthians 1:21–22). The Holy Spirit testifies to our hearts, minds, and spirits that the promises of God are true. The Holy Spirit confirms the truth of God's promises to us and assures us by His very presence in us that we belong to Christ (Romans 8:16). The Spirit confirms our adoption into God's family and therefore assures us that our hoped-for inheritance is certain (Romans 8:17). In fact, the Holy Spirit is God's pledge to us.

The Bible has much to say about hope, but this is what it says about our greatest hope. The ultimate Christian hope is that one day Christ will return and we who are looking forward to that return will go to be with Him forever (Titus 2:11–14). Because of Christ, we will triumph over sin, guilt, death, and hell itself (1 Corinthians 15:54–58; Romans 8:37). We will inherit eternal life to be enjoyed in the presence of our most loving and gracious God. We will even receive rewards for what we have done for Christ and we will reign with Him in a new world—a perfect world of love and righteousness. In this we hope and because God has promised it we know it will certainly happen (Hebrews 6:13–20). All God's promises find their fulfillment in Christ, our Lord and Savior. He is our hope (1 Timothy 1:1)!



COVID-19: How to Protect Yourself & Others

Updated April 24, 2020 CDC

Older adults and people who have severe underlying medical conditions like heart or lung disease or diabetes seem to be at higher risk for developing serious complications from COVID-19 illness.

Wash Your Hands Often

- <u>Wash your hands</u> often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds especially after you have been in a public place, or after blowing your nose, coughing, or sneezing.
- It's especially important to wash:
 - o Before eating or preparing food
 - $\circ \quad \text{Before touching your face} \\$
 - o After using the restroom
 - After leaving a public place
 - After blowing your nose, coughing, or sneezing

- After handling your cloth face covering
- After changing a diaper
- After caring for someone sick
- After touching animals or pets
- If soap and water are not available, use a hand sanitizer that has 60% alcohol.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth with unwashed hands.

(COVID-19 cont'd)

Avoid Close Contact

- Inside your home: Avoid close contact with people who are sick.
- **Outside your home:** Put 6 feet of distance between yourself and people who don't live in your household.
 - o Remember that some people without symptoms may be able to spread virus.
 - o Stay at least 6 feet (about 2 arms' length) from other people.

Cover Your Mouth and Nose with a Cloth Face Cover When Around Others

- You could spread COVID-19 to others even if you do not feel sick.
- The cloth face cover is meant to protect other people in case you are infected.
- Everyone should wear a <u>cloth face cover</u> in public.

Cover Coughs and Sneezes

- Always cover your mouth and nose with a tissue when you cough or sneeze or use the inside of your elbow.
- Throw used tissues in the trash.
- Wash your hands with soap and water for at least 20 seconds or use hand sanitizers with at least 60% alcohol.

Clean and Disinfect

- Clean AND disinfect frequently touched surfaces daily.
- If surfaces are dirty, clean them.
- Then, use a household disinfectant.

Monitor Your Health Daily

- Be alert for symptoms.
- Take your temperature if symptoms develop.
- Follow CDC guidance if symptoms develop
















MONEY Part Two of Five Devotionals

WHAT IS NORMAL?

The world is full of things competing for our attention. Everywhere we look, we see things that seem to call out to us saying, "Buy me!" or, "You need me!" Material possessions can lure us in so strongly that we start purchasing things that may not have been on our financial radar. And before we know it, we're in a toxic relationship with money and possessions, and we don't know how to get out of it. This is "normal" living for many people.

This normal way of spending and managing our money doesn't leave us in a good place. For example, it's normal to spend every bit of our income and not save any money for emergencies. It's also common to go into debt and never pay things off. It's "normal" to think that as long as we can afford the payment, we're good.

The Bible actually has a lot to say on the topic of money. In fact, it's one of the most talked about subjects in the entire book! A couple of things the Bible tells us about money is that it won't satisfy us (Ecclesiastes 5:10), and that when wealth is gained quickly, it'll dwindle quickly (Proverbs 13:11).

In Matthew 6:19-24, Jesus teaches about money and warns us against accumulating worldly "treasures." Instead, He challenges us to acquire "heavenly" treasures, because they never end and can never be destroyed. Jesus tells us that our heart will follow where we've placed our treasure. His final and most powerful exhortation to us is that we "can't serve both God and money" (Matthew 6:24 NLT).

We can keep doing what we see displayed in most of the world, or we can make changes and live better than normal.

Normal focuses on accumulating, while better than normal gives to others.

Normal allows money to lead, while better than normal seeks to be led by God.

Normal keeps 100% of our income, while better than normal trusts God with 90%.

Normal doesn't think ahead, while better than normal lives by a plan.

Normal is enslaved to debt, while better than normal saves to pay in full.

Normal thinks of today, while better than normal invests for the future.

Money isn't a bad thing by itself, but when we allow it to be our god, it can wreak havoc in our lives. The money we earn should be something we use and not something that uses or controls us.

What if we adjusted our normal mindset to have a better than normal one? Spend some time thinking through your relationship with money and see what needs to be changed.

Read and meditate on Proverbs 3:9, 22:7; Matthew 6:19-24; 1 Timothy 6:10; and Hebrews 13:5.

Celebrating Our History

THE ARTS

Arthur Mitchell – Born March 27, 1934 - American ballet dancer, choreographer and founder and director of ballet companies. Mitchell showed the way for black dancers.

Mitchell was one of four siblings and due to his father's absence, Mitchell worked numerous jobs, including shoe-shining, mopping floors, newspaper delivery, and work in a meat shop. Despite his duties, Mitchell became involved with street gangs, though this did not ultimately deter him from finding success. As a teenager, Mitchell was encouraged by a guidance counselor to apply for admission to the High School of Performing Arts. Upon being accepted he decided to work towards having a career in classical ballet. Following his graduation in the early 1950s, he won a dance award and scholarship to study at the School of American Ballet, the school affiliated with the New York City Ballet.

In 1954, following his 1952 Broadway debut in the opera Four Saints in Three Acts, Mitchell would return to Broadway to perform in the Harold Arlen musical House of Flowers, alongside Diahann Carroll, Geoffrey Holder, Alvin Ailey, Carmen de Lavallade, and Pearl Bailey. In 1955 he joined the New York City Ballet where he quickly rose to the position of premier danseur. During the 15 years with the company he electrified audiences with his performances in all the major ballets of the repertory. Choreographer and director of the NYCB George Balanchine created the pas de deux in Agon especially for Mitchell and the white Southern ballerina Diana Adams. Audience members initially complained about partnering Mitchell with a white woman, but Balanchine refused to change the pairing. Although Mitchell danced this role with white partners throughout the world, he could not perform it on commercial television in the United States until 1968, when the performance aired on Johnny Carson's The Tonight Show.

Mitchell left the New York City Ballet in 1966 to appear in several Broadway shows, and helped found ballet companies in Spoleto, Washington, D.C., and Brazil, where he directed a dance company. The company he founded in Brazil was the National Ballet Company of Brazil. Never forgetting how the arts had turned his own life around, he helped create dance companies in Spoleto, Washington, D.C., and Brazil, but it was upon learning of the death of Martin Luther King, Jr., that Mitchell determined to do something to provide children in Harlem the kinds of

opportunities which he felt had been given to him.

The Dance Theatre of Harlem was born in 1969 with 30 kids in a church basement in a community where resources of talent and creative energy were virtually untapped. Two months later, there were 400 youngsters attending classes. Eventually, Mitchell used his personal savings to convert a garage into the company's first real home. In Harlem, DTH created an explosion of professional opportunity in dance, music, and related theater activities. The school has an outstanding number of former students who, today, are successfully engaged in careers as dancers and musicians, as technicians in production, stagecraft, and wardrobe, and in instruction and arts administration. And with this success, DTH challenged the dance world to review its stereotypes and revise its boundaries. Mitchell died September 19, 2018 at the age of 84.

Garland Anderson – Born February 18, 1886 (died June 1, 1939). Garland was born in Wichita, Kansas the fourth of 12 children. After about four years, his family then moved to San

Francisco California.



During the first decade of the 20th century, Anderson worked as a newsboy, decades later, his old boss remembered him working before the 1906 San Francisco earthquake and fire. He may have been a railroad porter after the fire. For about 15 years beginning around 1909, Anderson worked as a bellhop at several hotels. According to a 1918 draft card, Anderson was married and a hotel clerk in San Francisco. In the 1920 census Anderson, divorced, worked on Sutter Street as an operator. His life as a bellhop was the basis for his play *Appearances*.

Anderson wrote "Don't Judge By Appearances" in three weeks. According to his typist, she became engrossed by it and it helped her solve a personal problem. He

showed the play to San Francisco Chronicle critic George Warren, who thought the idea was very good, but its writing needed work. Anderson received support from friends and co-workers at his hotel because of his optimism and enthusiasm. He related to Al Jolson, who supported the play's early development and Anderson's move to New York City in 1924. Anderson, living at the Braeburn Apartments on Sutter Street. By Christmas, Anderson reported a leave of absence from the Braeburn Apartments Hotel, where he was a switchboard operator, and was being supported by Al Jolson, Marjorie Rambeau, Channing Pollock and Richard Bennett. He stayed at the Harlem YMCA.

Appearances previewed in Elmira, New York, on September 26 and Utica on the 27th, opening at the

Frolic Theater (atop the New Amsterdam Theatre) in New York on October 13, 1925. Lionel Monagas and Mildred Wall, who worked into the 1940s, played the leads. The play received a standing ovation on opening night but lukewarm reviews, although Anderson was praised. The New York Times called it "finely conceived, crudely wrought. ... If the language of the play is not always smooth and eloquent, if many of the characters are overdrawn, if the plot dips too often into melodrama, the play is none the less moving ...




Garland Anderson's play *Appearances* (1925) was the first play of African American authorship to be produced on Broadway,

but Black theatre did not create a Broadway hit until Langston Hughes's *Mulatto* (1935) won wide acclaim.

Harry Belafonte and Juanita Hill – 1st African American Man and Woman to win a Tony Award



Harry Belafonte was born Harold George Bellanfanti Jr. on March 1, 1927. One of the most successful Jamaican-American pop stars in history, he was dubbed the "King of Calypso" for popularizing the Trinidadian Caribbean musical style with an international audience in the 1950s. His breakthrough album Calypso (1956) was the first million-selling LP by a single artist. He has also starred in several films, including Otto Preminger's hit musical Carmen Jones (1954), Island in the Sun (1957), and Robert Wise's Odds Against Tomorrow (1959).

Belafonte was an early supporter of the Civil Rights Movement in the 1950s and 1960s and was a confident of

Martin Luther King Jr. Throughout his career, he has been an advocate for political and humanitarian causes, such as the Anti-Apartheid Movement and USA for Africa. Since 1987, he has been a UNICEF Goodwill Ambassador. He was a vocal critic of the policies of the George W. Bush presidential administrations. Belafonte acts as the American Civil Liberties Union celebrity ambassador for juvenile justice issues.





Juanita Hall was born née Long, November 6, 1901 (died February 29, 1968). She is remembered for her roles in the original stage and screen versions of the Rodgers and Hammerstein musicals South Pacific as Bloody Mary – a role that garnered her the Tony Award – and Flower Drum Song as Madame Liang.

In 1950, she became the first African American to win a Tony Award for Best Supporting Actress for her role as Bloody Mary in South Pacific starring Ezio Pinza and Mary Martin. She also won a Donaldson Award for playing that role. She played the role for 1,925 performances on Broadway at the Majestic Theatre beginning on April 7, 1949. She also starred in the 1954 Broadway musical House of Flowers in which she sang and danced Harold Arlen's Slide Boy Slide.

In addition to her role in South Pacific, she was a regular performer in clubs in Greenwich Village, where she captivated audiences with her renditions of "Am I Blue?", "Lament Over Love", and Langston Hughes' "Cool Saturday Night".

In 1958, she recorded Juanita Hall Sings the Blues (at Beltone Studios in New York City), backed by a group of jazz musicians that included Claude Hopkins, Coleman Hawkins, Buster Bailey, Doc Cheatham, and George Duvivier. In 1958, she reprised Bloody Mary in the film version of South Pacific, for which her singing part was dubbed (because of legal matters involving copyright), at Richard Rodgers's request, by Muriel Smith, who had played the role in the London production. The same year, Hall starred in Flower Drum Song, another Broadway show by Rodgers and Hammerstein. She also toured in the road show version of Flower Drum Song, but she had to leave it in early 1962 because of illness.


Marian Anderson – an American contralto born February 27, 1897 in Philadelphia (died April 8, 1993). Marian was the eldest of the three Anderson children. Her two sisters, Alyse (1899– 1965) and Ethel (1902–90), also became singers.





On July 17, 1943, in Bethel, Connecticut, Anderson was married to architect Orpheus H. Fisher (1900–86), known as 'King'. Fisher had asked her to marry him when they were teenagers. The couple had purchased a 100-acre farm in Danbury, Connecticut, in 1940 after an exhaustive search throughout New York, New Jersey and Connecticut. The property remained Anderson's home for almost 50 years. After Marian's death in 1993, the property was sold to developers who wanted to tear down the home and studio that was built on the property. However, the Danbury Museum and Historical Society received a grant from the State of Connecticut and relocated the structure, restored it, and opened it to the public in 2004. In addition to seeing the studio, visitors can see photographs and memorabilia from milestones in Anderson's career.

Anderson pursued studies privately in her native city through the continued support of the Philadelphia black community, first with Agnes Reifsnyder, then Giuseppe Boghetti. She met Boghetti through the principal of her high school. Anderson auditioned for him singing "Deep River" and he was immediately brought to tears. Boghetti scheduled a recital of English, Russian, Italian, and German music at The Town Hall in New York City in April 1924 which took place in an almost empty hall and received poor reviews.

On January 7, 1955, Anderson became the first African-American to sing with the Metropolitan Opera in New York. At the invitation of director Rudolf Bing, she sang the part of Ulrica in Giuseppe Verdi's Un ballo in Maschera. Anderson said later about the evening, "The curtain rose on the second scene and I was there on stage, mixing the witch's brew. I trembled, and when the audience applauded and applauded before I could sing a note, I felt myself tightening into a knot." Although she never appeared with the company again after this production, Anderson was named a permanent member of the Metropolitan Opera company.

THERE, not Here...

When Mary Magdalene and two other women went to Jesus' tomb after His death, an angel said to them, "He is not here. He has risen! He is going ahead of you into Galilee. "There" you will see Him."

Notice that the angel said, "He is not here. He is there." The angel was saying, in effect, "I know you're hurting, but don't stay here. Something better is waiting for you there."

In other words, "here" is the disappointment, the bad medical report, the dream that didn't work out. If you stay "here", you'll be discouraged. You have to go "there."

Sometimes the reason God doesn't comfort us in the "here," in the disappointment, is because He doesn't want us to stay where we are. "There" is where God is waiting for you. "There" is where the blessing is.

The disappointment is simply a season. God has already gone ahead and lined up the next level. Move forward into "there" where Jesus is waiting "there" with restoration and blessings.

How did you do? Results for Bible Quiz: Love the Lord your God

1) When someone asked Jesus which was the most important of all the commandments, he replied, "Love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind, and with all your strength."

In His *Parable of the Wise and Foolish Builders*, in Matthew 7:24-27 and Luke 6:46-49, Jesus tells of one man who built his house on a foundation of rock and another man who built a house on sand. What group of people is represented by the man who built on the foundation of rock?

The correct answer is: Those who know and obey Jesus' teachings. Jesus said in <u>John 14:21</u>, "Whoever has my commands and obeys them, he is the one who loves me. He who loves me will be loved by my Father, and I too will love him and show myself to him." (NIV)

2) In the *Parable of the Two Sons*, in Matthew 21:28-32, a father tells his two sons to go work in his vineyard. The first son refuses but later changes his mind and does go to work. The second son agrees to work but never actually does. Which lesson was Jesus teaching in this parable?

The correct answer is: A person who truly loves God will obey His commandments. Obedience is the supreme test of faith in God (<u>1 Samuel 15:22-24</u>), or, as the NT puts it, "Faith without works is dead" (<u>James 2:14-26</u>). Thus, obedience and faith are always very closely linked in the Bible.

3) The *Parable of the Vine* appears in John 15:1-8. Jesus compares himself to a grapevine, us to the branches, and God to the gardener. Which is a lesson of this parable?

The correct answer is: We should put our trust in God and do His work on earth. We must be fruitful. From a vine we look for grapes, and from a Christian we look for Christianity; this is the fruit, a Christian temper and disposition, a Christian life and conversation, Christian devotions and Christian designs. We must honor God, and do good, and exemplify the purity and power of the religion we profess; and this is bearing fruit.

4) The *Parable of the Rich Fool* appears in Luke 12:16-21. A successful farmer had to build bigger barns to store all his grain and goods. Once he had done this, he decided he had enough stored up to just take it easy. Which point was Jesus making this parable?

The correct answer is: We should put our trust in God rather than in material things. One is to be rich in spiritual things, which will last, as opposed to being rich only in material things, which will not last.

5) The *Parable of the Great Banquet* is found in Luke 14:15-24. A man prepared a feast and invited many guests to dine with him. However, one by one, the guests made up excuses to not come to the banquet. In exasperation, the host then invited anyone he could find to eat the feast he had prepared. Which is one lesson of the parable?

The correct answer is: We should be committed to our faith. Just like the guests who made excuses, we are tempted to make excuses for having only a superficial devotion to our faith, while actually putting worldly concerns first in our lives.

6) In the *Parable of the Talents*, Matthew 25:14-30, a man went on a journey and left his goods and money in the care of his servants. According to their ability, he gave five talents to one servant, two to a second servant, and one talent to a third servant. Who did the man embarking on the journey represent?

The correct answer is: Jesus. A talent was a certain amount of silver worth a great deal of money. The man going on the journey expected his servants to use the money they had been entrusted with to earn interest for him. Just as the man in the parable, Jesus will return sometime in the future. In the meantime, we should use the material things and abilities we have been given to further His work on earth.

7) Who did the first two servants represent?

The correct answer is: Good Christians. The two servants who made good use of what had been entrusted to them received high praise from their master, and a promise of even more responsibility in the future. On the other hand, the master was angry with the third servant who merely hid his talent in the ground and did not use it profitably.

8) The *Parable of the Pharisee and the Tax Collector* is found in Luke 18:9-14. A Pharisee brags about how righteous he is while a corrupt tax collector who has repented begs for mercy from God. Which is a lesson of this parable?

The correct answer is: We should humble ourselves in the presence of God. Pharisees were highly-regarded religious leaders in first-century Judaism, while tax collectors were agents of the occupying Roman forces and often corruptly demanded more tax than was due, keeping the excess for themselves. Despite this, the Pharisee was the sinner in this parable because of his arrogance and self-righteousness. Worse, the Pharisee did not even admit his sin. In contrast, the tax collector humbled himself, admitted his sin and begged God for mercy. Jesus said it was the tax collector, not the Pharisee, who was justified before God.

9) What is the lesson of the Parable of the Friend who Came at Midnight in Luke 11:5-8

The correct answer is: Always pray and don't give up until the answer comes. Prayer is loving communication with God. God answers prayer requests in His own way in His own time, and will not grant requests that are against His holy and wise purposes, are selfish in nature, are not in our best long-term interest, or those made with impure motives. Often, we must be persistent in prayer. The answer, when it comes, may be in a form radically different than we expected.

10) What is the lesson of the Parable of the Persistent Widow in Luke 18:1-8

The correct answer is: Always pray and don't give up until the answer comes. Prayer is the expression of our inner spiritual needs. Through prayer we can find strength of spirit, guidance and wisdom, joy and inner peace. Jesus spent a lot of time praying. He often went to a solitary place and prayed for hours at a time, especially at difficult times in His ministry. The famous Lord's Prayer, in Matthew 6:9-15, is Jesus' model of the perfect prayer.
