RESURRECTION

Resurrection in a nutshell is bringing back to life. The synonyms for resurrection are:

Reappearance, rebirth, restoration, resurgence, revival, reawakening and return to life. So, we see it does not only apply to bringing back a person to life.

From a religious concept, it is used in two distinct respects:

- 1. Belief in the resurrection of individual souls that are current and ongoing.
- 2. Belief in a singular resurrection of the dead at the end of the world.

The death and resurrection of Jesus, is the central focus of Christianity. There are also the scientific examples of people dying, pronounced clinically dead and then life is restored to them. This is called the Lazarus syndrome.

Resurrection from the Latin noun "resurrection-onis" and the verb, "rego" means; to make straight, to rise up, get up and stand up.

In Christianity, resurrection most critically concerns:

- 1. Resurrection of Jesus He was raised from the dead, ascended to God the Father to return as the Messiah. (1 Thessalonians 1:10)
- 2. Resurrection of Judgement Day The dead in Christ shall arise. (1 Thessalonians 4:16)

While most people, especially Christians focus on Resurrection as a human body that is dead, coming back to life, let's look at resurrection in other areas of our lives. We can experience resurrection in:

- 1. Marriages
- 2. Finances
- 3. Jobs
- 4. Family
- 5. Health
- 6. Our Spiritual Walk

Any situation in our lives that seem dead can be resurrected by fasting and prayer. Matthew 21:22 says, "And all things you ask in prayer, believing, you will receive." You need to ask God in prayer, pray according to His will and pray in faith.

When you think your marriage is ending, don't just give up and run to the nearest attorney, commit the situation to God, ask Him for direction, trust God to resurrect the desire for each other and see how He comes through for you. Same concept applies to Finances, Jobs, Family and Health. I will walk you through Spiritual Walk.

When you reach the point where you don't want to fellowship with the saints, you don't want to pray and go to church you have become spiritually dead. For God to resurrect you spiritually, you have to make sacrifices. Start with playing worship songs, play them until it becomes a habit. Sing along with the songs, at some point you will not remember the words but the music will still be bursting in you. Make up your own words, tell God you love Him, tell Him how good and awesome He is. Pretty soon your song will become worship and praise. Things will start happening within you. The pruning process has now started and old things and habits are being cut away for the new life to increase in you. You will soon start praying and praising until you can't wait for Wednesdays to come around to go to Bible Studies and Sundays for church and Sunday School.

We have to learn to praise our way out of dead situations for Resurrection to take place and for this to happen, we need to prune the dead areas of our lives so new growth can take place.



April is Parkinson Awareness Month





Parkinson's Disease is often misunderstood by many, and for those who have it, it can be hard to get the resources you need to handle everyday life. This month is all about bringing awareness to this condition, allowing those who have it to seek help and for those who don't to learn more about what it means to have it.

History of Parkinson's Awareness Month

Parkinson's Disease has been around since the times of the Egyptians, but many of the sources before the 12th century would describe symptoms of PD, but would not be able to explain any more than that. Such sources include Egyptian scriptures, the

Bible, and the Roman Empire. It wasn't until the 19th century when James Parkinson would publish an essay describing this condition that Parkinson's Disease would exist as a term, even if it didn't immediately get recognition. It wasn't until 40 years later that the essay would get noticed. The 20th century involved the research of scientists from all over the world, but as doctors would prescribe treatments, a cure couldn't be found.

One celebrity that is known to have Parkinson's Disease is Michael J. Fox, a Canadian who reached fame through his charismatic personality in some of his most famous acting roles throughout the 80's and 90's. His diagnosis in 1991 inspired him to help, founding the Michael J. Fox Foundation for Parkinson's research to help others learn about the disease and find ways of managing and treating this condition. Parkinson's Awareness Month is part of the core of foundations such as the MJF Foundation, and this month-long holiday encourages people to learn about the disease, donate to foundations to help with research and support those who do have it in any way they can.

<u>Easter Sunday</u>, as it's known in <u>Christianity</u>, is actually considered the *most* important and sacred Sunday of the entire year. It marks the anniversary of Jesus' resurrection and ascension to heaven — and observing this holiday can teach Christians a lot more about faith than bunnies.

Easter arrives at the <u>end of Holy Week</u> and right after Good Friday, which <u>commemorates</u> <u>Jesus' crucifixion and death</u>. Where Good Friday is essentially a day of mourning, Easter celebrates Jesus' evasion of death. It's not uncommon for Christians to greet each other by <u>saying "Christ has risen"</u> in the same way they'd say "Merry Christmas."

This greeting doesn't just acknowledge the belief that Jesus rose from His grave. It's also used as a confirmation of faith. The Bible states that if Jesus hadn't risen, Christian preaching and faith would have been "in vain" or even "empty." In other words, the belief that Christians have in Jesus' divinity is rooted in the moment of His resurrection.

Without that part of the Easter story, Jesus simply dies and that's it. According to the Bible, Jesus' death was a sacrifice for the sins of others, but His resurrection represents <u>something</u> even more powerful: the potential for rebirth, salvation, and renewal of faith.

That's why Easter celebrations are preceded by Lent (a time of abstinence and penance), the <u>Easter Vigil (when new believers are baptized)</u>, and, sometimes, <u>the sacrament of confession</u>. After a season of shedding bad habits and resisting temptations, Easter is the perfect opportunity for Christians to recommit to their beliefs.

So, despite the pastel-colored decorations and kids' games, Easter is a pretty serious holiday at its core. It celebrates Christians' belief in the divine power of Jesus and the hope that <u>loss</u> <u>leads to something new</u>. This doesn't mean it's all gloom and doom, but Easter definitely calls for some solemn reflection among observant Christians. Luckily, many are able to make time for church services *and* an egg hunt or two.

Though the Journey May Be Long

Last week, I ordered a new book from Amazon. I was SO excited to receive it, and to start spending some time reading again. I was picturing my days and planning out how I would find some time to squeeze in a few moments for myself to just relax and read. Well, the book arrived in the most beat up box I've ever seen. That box looked like it had been kicked and tossed around, and then stomped a few times for good measure! I'm no stranger to having things delivered; in fact, the delivery guys and I are on a first name basis. However, I was very disappointed with the way this particular delivery showed up—so disappointed that I just left the box sitting by the front door for several days. I would walk by and just shake my head at the box's condition. Meanwhile, my four year old was also eyeing the package but for a very

different reason. She was imagining all the possibilities for that old beat up box instead of judging it like I was.

Finally, one day she said, "Mom, let's see what you have in that box. I bet it's something really cool!" It then dawned on me: yes, there is something really cool in there, and I should be enjoying it instead of pouting about how it arrived! So, we opened it; and she ran off happily with that beat up old box. I took a look at the book inside, and it was in pristine condition. Not so much as a scuff or bent corner. I must admit, I felt pretty silly. I spent so much time reeling how bad the box appeared, that I didn't even pause long enough to actually check the most important part—the package inside. After all, that's what I had been waiting for, right? Dreams of some sweet quiet me-time moments were hinging on the arrival of that book. So how did I get so easily distracted by...the box?! Honestly, I was so wrapped up in how terrible "the journey" must've been for my poor \$10 Amazon order that I forgot to actually appreciate and celebrate that it ARRIVED. I almost missed out on an amazing book, because I was too distracted by *how* it arrived...imagine that.

Appreciation is one of those things that's very hard to grasp when you're in the thick of it. Oftentimes we find ourselves getting so wrapped up in the "hows and whys" that it's almost impossible to muster up any appreciation when things aren't going well. When I reflect over the past 12 months, it still feels like a big cloud of disbelief at times. The uncertainty and fear have taken its toll on us all; and it has been enough to make even the most devout believer waiver a bit. The losses have been and still are overwhelming. It is hard to "appreciate" tough times.

Thinking of that old beat up box led me to feel as if someone put us all in a big box, taped up all the sides so that there's no escaping, and sent us on what has been the bumpiest, most alarming journey of our lives. The box has been tossed around, kicked, shoved with little to no regard; and we're just bouncing around inside waiting and praying for the turbulence to stop. Clinging to the word that says "Fear not, for I am with you; be not dismayed, for I am your God; I will strengthen you, I will help you, I will uphold you with my righteous right hand (Isaiah 41:10)" and merely just surviving. So, imagine my exact words were "Thank you, Jesus!" when I retrieved the perfectly untouched book from inside that tattered old box. Shaken, but not shattered. Kicked around, but still standing.

Are you following me? I'm convinced that God is calling us to trust Him and to consider WHERE He's taking us rather than HOW we're getting there. Of course, the journey is important—lessons to be learned, faith to be strengthened—and, it may be very difficult; but the destination will be awe-inspiring!



We are on this journey for a reason. There may very well be different reasons, but definitely reasons all ordained by God. We can only see a little of the road ahead of us. We can't see what is around the curve or what awaits us at the next intersection; but our faith sustains us and has brought us this far! The beauty in a journey this long and this tumultuous is that we have a traveling companion. One who never leaves our side. No matter how bumpy the road, or how beat up, kicked around, and disheveled we are when we arrive. We WILL arrive. My brothers and sisters, don't miss the rainbow at the end of this storm because you were too focused on how loud the thunder has been and how close the lightening has struck. We serve a God that is bigger than any journey we will ever face.

I'd like to leave you with this thought: there was a man who took His own journey. He arrived to His destination beaten, battered and bruised. What if He had quit along the way? He very well could have. We know that Jesus is all-powerful. He could have put an end to His misery and made His journey much less gruesome at any moment. However, His journey was a part of the divine plan. Without the betrayal, there would be no arrest. Without the arrest, there would be no persecution. Without the persecution, there would be no crucifixion. Without the crucifixion, there would be no cross. And without the cross, there would be no salvation. So, you see, the journey was cruel. It was grim. Nevertheless, the outcome was astonishing! Heaven-sent! Miraculous! (Praise Break!!)

Here we are, celebrating another Easter without being able to physically worship and fellowship with one another. Of course, we all miss that fellowship; and one day we will be together again. However, absolutely nothing has changed about the crucifixion, death, burial and resurrection of Jesus Christ. A year away from the church building can't change it. A pandemic can't change it. Days that have been filled with loss, uncertainty and concern cannot change it. In fact, be encouraged by the story of *THE* journey that was far worse than you or I could ever imagine; but *that* journey yielded the Greatest Gift and sacrifice of all. My prayer for you is strength to keep holding on. There is light shining through. I hope that you feel the warmth of God's light and continue clinging to His unchanging word.

Christ Jesus died on the Cross to redeem mankind, to save us from our sins because of His love for us. As recorded in the Gospels of Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John in the Holy Bible, Jesus Christ was mocked, scorned, and condemned to death by Pontius Pilate, He carried His Cross up the Via Dolorosa in Jerusalem to Calvary, was nailed to the cross, and hung between two common thieves. He suffered an indescribable end, recalled by the Church on Good Friday of

Holy Week. One may meditate on the Passion of Christ by reflecting on His Seven Sayings on the Cross.

Here are His **Seven Sayings**, the last seven expressions of Jesus Christ on the Cross recorded in Scripture.

THE FIRST WORDS

"Father, forgive them, for they know not what they do."

Luke 23:34

Jesus of Nazareth is looking down from the cross just after He was crucified between two thieves. He sees the soldiers who have mocked, scourged, and tortured Him, and who have just nailed Him to the cross. He probably remembers those who have sentenced Him - Caiaphas and the high priests of the Sanhedrin. Pilate realized it was out of envy that they handed Him over (Matthew 27:18, Mark 15:10). But is Jesus not also thinking of His Apostles who have deserted him, to Peter who has denied Him three times, to the fickle crowd who only days before praised Him on His entrance to Jerusalem, and then days later demanded His crucifixion?

Is He also thinking of us, who daily forget Him in our lives?

Does He react angrily? No! At the height of His physical suffering, His love prevails, and He asks His Father to forgive! Could there ever be greater irony? Jesus asks His Father to forgive, but it is by His very Sacrifice on the Cross that mankind can be forgiven!

Right up to His final hours on earth, Jesus preaches forgiveness. He teaches forgiveness in the Lord's prayer: "Forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us" (Matthew 6:12). When asked by Peter, how many times should we forgive someone, Jesus answers seventy times seven (Matthew 18:21-22). He forgives the paralytic at Capernaum (Mark 2:3-12), the sinful woman who anointed Him in the home of Simon the Pharisee (Luke 7:37-48), and the adulteress caught in the act and about to be stoned (John 8:1-11). During the Institution of the Eucharist at the Last Supper, Jesus tells them to drink of the cup: "Drink of it, all of you; for this is my blood of the covenant, which is poured out for many for the forgiveness of sins" (Matthew 26:27-28). And even following His Resurrection, His first act is to commission His disciples to forgive: "Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained."

THE SECOND WORDS

Verily, I say unto thee, today shalt thou be with me in Paradise."

Luke 23:43

Now it is not just the religious leaders or the soldiers that mock Jesus, but even one of the thieves, a downward progression of mockery. But the thief on the right speaks up for Jesus, explaining the two thieves are receiving their just due, whereas "this man has done nothing wrong." Then, turning to Jesus, he asks, "Jesus, remember me when you come in your kingdom" (Luke 23:42). What wonderful faith this repentant sinner has in Jesus - far more than the doubting Thomas, one of His own Apostles. Ignoring His own suffering, Jesus responds with mercy in His second word, living out His own Beatitude, "Blessed are the merciful, for they shall obtain mercy."

The second word again is about forgiveness, this time directed to a sinner. Just as the first word, this Biblical expression is found only in the Gospel of Luke. Jesus shows His Divinity by opening heaven for a repentant sinner such generosity to a man that only asked to be remembered! This expression offers us hope for salvation, for if we turn our hearts and prayers to Him and accept His forgiveness, we will also be with Jesus Christ at the end of our lives.

THE THIRD WORDS

"Woman, behold thy son."
Then saith He to the disciple, "Behold thy mother!"
John 19:26-27

Jesus and Mary are together again, at the beginning of His ministry in Cana and now at the end of His public ministry at the foot of the Cross. John is the only disciple to record Our Lord's mother Mary at the Cross. The Lord refers to His mother as *woman* at the Wedding Feast of Cana (John 2:1-11).

What sorrow must fill Mary's heart! How she must have felt meeting her Son as He carried the Cross on the Via Dolorosa. And then she had to watch Him being nailed to the Cross. Once again, a sword pierces Mary's soul: we are reminded of the prophecy of Simeon at the Presentation of the infant Jesus in the Temple (Luke 2:35).

The loved ones of Jesus are with Him in John's Gospel. There are four at the foot of the cross, Mary His Mother, John, the disciple whom He loved, His mother's sister Mary the wife of Clopas, and Mary Magdalene. He addresses His third word to His mother Mary and John, the only eyewitness of the Gospel writers.

Jesus again rises above the occasion as He cares for the ones that love Him. The good son that He is, Jesus is concerned about looking after His mother.

THE FOURTH WORDS

"Eli, Eli, lama sabachthani? That is to say My God, my God, why hast thou forsaken me?"

Matthew 27:46 and Mark 15:34

This was the only expression of Jesus in the Gospels of Matthew and Mark. Both Gospels related that it was in the ninth hour, after 3 hours of darkness, that He cried out this fourth word. The ninth hour was three o'clock in Judea. Jesus of Nazareth fulfills the Messianic prophecy of the Suffering Servant of the Lord (Isaiah 53: 2, Mark 15:28, Luke 24:46). After the fourth Word, Mark related with a horrible sense of finality, "And Jesus uttered a loud cry, and breathed His last" (Mark 15:37). One is struck by the anguished tone of this expression in contrast to the first three words of Jesus. He feels separated from His Father.

This cry is from the painful heart of the human Jesus who must feel deserted by His Father and the Holy Spirit, not to mention His earthly companions the disciples, who "all left Him and fled" (Matthew 26:56, Mark 14:50). As if to

emphasize His loneliness, Mark (15:40) even has His loved ones "looking on from afar." Jesus is now all alone, and He must face death by himself. But is not this exactly what happens to all of us when we die? We too are all alone at the time of death! Jesus completely lives the human experience as we do, and by doing so, frees us from the clutches of sin.

His fourth Word is the opening line of Psalm 22, and thus His cry from the Cross recalls the cry of Israel, and of all innocent persons who suffer. Psalm 22 of David makes a striking prophecy of the crucifixion of the Messiah at a time when crucifixion was not known to exist: "They have pierced my hands and my feet, they have numbered all my bones" (Psalm 22:16-17). The Psalm continues: "They divide my garments among them, and for my vesture they cast lots" (Psalm 22:18).

There cannot be a more dreadful moment in the history of man as this moment. Jesus who came to save us is crucified, and He realizes the horror of what is happening and what He now is enduring. He is about to be engulfed in the raging sea of sin. Evil triumphs, as Jesus admits: "But this is your hour" (Luke 22:53). But it is only for a moment. The burden of all the sins of humanity for a moment overwhelm the humanity of our Savior.

But does this not have to happen? Does this not have to occur if Jesus is to save us? It is in defeat of His humanity that the Divine plan of His Father will be completed. It is by His death that we are redeemed. "For there is one God. There is also one mediator between God and humans, Christ Jesus, himself human, who gave himself as ransom for all" (I Timothy 2:5-6). "Who His own self bare our sins in His own body on the tree, that we, being dead to sins, should live unto righteousness: By whose stripes ye were healed." 1 Peter 2:24

THE FIFTH WORDS "I thirst." John 19:28

The fifth word of Jesus is His only human expression of His physical suffering. Jesus is now in shock. The wounds inflicted upon Him in the scourging, the crowning with thorns, losing blood on the three-hour walk through the city of Jerusalem on the Via Dolorosa to Golgotha, and the nailing upon the cross are now taking their toll.

The Gospel of John first refers to thirst when Jesus meets the Samaritan woman at the well. After first asking for "a drink," He answers the woman, "Everyone who drinks of this water will be thirsty again, but those who drink of the water that I will give them will never be thirsty. The water that I will give will become in them a spring of water gushing up to eternal life" (John 4:13-14). This passage implies there is more than just physical thirst.

Jesus also thirsts in a spiritual sense. He thirsts for love. He thirsts for the love of His Father, who has left Him unaided during this dreadful hour when He must fulfill His mission all alone. And He thirsts for the love and salvation of His people, humans. Jesus practiced what He preached: "This is my commandment, that ye love one another, as I have loved you. Greater love has no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends." John 15:12-13

THE SIXTH WORDS

When Jesus therefore had received the vinegar, He said, "It is finished;" and He bowed His head and gave up the ghost.

John 19:30

The Gospel of John recalls the sacrifice of the Passover Lamb in Exodus 12 in this passage. The soldiers offered wine on a sprig of hyssop to the Lord. Hyssop is a small plant that was used to sprinkle the blood of the Passover Lamb on the doorposts of the Hebrews (Exodus 12:22). John's Gospel related that it was the Day of Preparation, the day *before* the actual Sabbath Passover, that Jesus was sentenced to death (Exodus 19:14) and sacrificed on the

Cross (John 19:31). John continues in John 19:33-34: "But when they came to Jesus and saw He was already dead, they did not break His legs," recalling the instruction in Exodus 12:46 concerning the Passover Lamb. He died at the ninth hour (three o'clock in the afternoon), about the same time as the Passover lambs were slaughtered in the Temple. Christ became the Paschal or Passover Lamb, as noted by St. Paul: "For Christ our Passover lamb has been sacrificed" (First Corinthians 5:7). The innocent Lamb was slain for our sins, so that we might be forgiven. It is now a fait accomplished. The sixth word is Jesus' recognition that His suffering is over, and His task is completed. Jesus is obedient to the Father and gives His love for mankind by redeeming us with His death on the Cross.

And the Gospels as a group captured this paradox. The Synoptic Gospels narrated the horror of the event - the agony in the garden, the abandonment by His Apostles, the trial before the Sanhedrin, the intense mockery and torture heaped upon Jesus, His suffering all alone, the darkness over the land, and His death, starkly portrayed by both Matthew (Matthew 27:47-51) and Mark (15:33-38).

In contrast, the passion of Jesus in the Gospel of John expresses His Kingship and proves to be His triumphant road to glory. John presents Jesus as directing the action the entire way. The phrase "It is finished" carries a sense of accomplishment. In John, there is no trial before the Sanhedrin, but rather Jesus is introduced at the Roman trial as "Behold your King!" (John 19:14). Jesus is not stumbling or falling as in the Synoptic Gospels, but the way of the Cross is presented with majesty and dignity, for "Jesus went out bearing His own Cross" (John 19:17). And in John, the inscription at the head of the cross is pointedly written "Jesus of Nazareth, The King of the Jews" (John 19:19).

When Jesus died, He "handed over" the Spirit. Jesus remained in control to the end, and it is He who handed over His Spirit. One should not miss the double entendre here, for this may also be interpreted as His death brought forth the Holy Spirit.

The Gospel of John gradually reveals the Holy Spirit. Jesus mentions *living water* in John 4:10 and during the Feast of Tabernacles refers to living water as the Holy Spirit in John 7:37-39. At the <u>Last Supper</u>, Christ announces He would ask the Father to send "another Advocate to be with you always, the Spirit of truth" (John 14:16-17). The word Advocate is also translated as Comforter, Helper, Paraclete, or Counselor. "But the Advocate, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, will teach you everything, and remind you of all that I have said to you" (John 14:26).

THE SEVENTH WORDS

Jesus when He had cried with a loud voice, He said, "Father, into thy hands I commend my spirit." Luke 23:46

The seventh word of Jesus is from the Gospel of Luke, and is directed to the Father in heaven, just before He dies. Jesus recalls <u>Psalm</u> 31:5 - "Into thy hands I commend my spirit; thou hast redeemed me, O Lord, faithful God."

Jesus was obedient to His Father to the end, and His final word before His death on the Cross was a prayer to His Father.

The relationship of Jesus to the Father is revealed in the Gospel of John, for He remarked, "The Father and I are one" (John 10:30), and again at the Last Supper: "Do you not believe I am in the Father and the Father is in me? The words that I speak to you I do not speak on my own. The Father who dwells in me is doing His works" (John 14:10). And He can return: "I came from the Father and have come into the world; again, I am leaving the world and going to the Father" (John 16:28). Jesus fulfills His own mission and that of His Father on the Cross:

"For God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish but have everlasting life." John 3:16

"WERE YOU THERE"

History

Were You There (When They Crucified My Lord) is an American <u>spiritual</u> that was first printed in 1899. There are some of the more recent plantation hymns which have added an element of culture without diminishing religious fervor. One of the best of these is "Were You There When They Crucified My Lord?" It dwells on the details of the crucifixion, and the separate stanzas add only a single line each to the song. It is a tender and beautiful hymn, the climax of its effect depending largely on the hold and slur on the exclamation "Oh!" with which the third line begins, and the repetition and expression of the word "*tremble! tremble! tremble!"* —William Eleazar Barton, *Old Plantation Hymns* (1899)

"Were You There" was likely composed by enslaved African-Americans in the 19th century. It was first published in William Eleazar Barton's 1899 Old Plantation Hymns. In 1940, it was included in the Episcopal Church hymnal, making it the first spiritual to be included in any major American hymnal. As reported in Howard Thurman's autobiography, the song was one of Mahatma Gandhi's favorites. The song has been recorded by artists including Paul Robeson, Marion Williams, Johnny Cash, Phil Keaggy, Max Roach, Diamanda Galás, Harry Belafonte, The Seldom Scene, Diamond Version (with Neil Tennant), Bayard Rustin, Rajaton, and Chris Rice. A critic from The Indianapolis News wrote about Paul Robeson's rendition of Were You There, saying that "It was as startling and vivid a disclosure of reverent feeling of penetrating pathos as one could imagine."

Lyrics

The following lyrics are those printed in the 1899 Unicorn. *Old Plantation Hymns*; other variations exist.

Lyrical Analysis

"Were You There" utilizes a system of coded language in its lyrics like most, if not all, African-American spirituals. Metaphors, especially those involving Old Testament figures, as well as Jesus, are often central to the meanings of spirituals. "Were You There" tells the story of the Crucifixion of Jesus. Underneath this narrative, however, is a metaphor likening Jesus's suffering to the suffering of slaves. In some versions of the song, the singer asks "Were you there when they nailed Him to the Tree?" Replacing Jesus' cross with a tree further strengthens the metaphor between Jesus' suffering and slaves' suffering. African-Americans during the antebellum period, and all the way into the Jim Crow era, would have drawn a connection between Jesus nailed to a tree and the frightening prevalence of lynchings in their own lives. This expression of likening one's experience to Jesus' is underscored by the first-person, present-tense perspective of "Were You There;" the singer personally witnesses the crucifixion. The use of first person pronouns in the spiritual reflects a sense of "communal selfhood" formed by African-American slaves in the face of oppression.

Jesus—the Last, Most Tender Word YESHUA

There is tenderness even in the name "Jesus," a name that contains a promise. Rendered *Yeshua* in Hebrew, it means "Yahweh is salvation," thereby linking Jesus to the holiest name for God in Scripture. God comes into clearest focus in the life of Jesus—a God who surprises us not only by His power but by the greatness of His love. Jesus is also called the *Logos* or "Word." He is God's definitive message to the human race.

While searching the Gospels for the tender words of Jesus, Ann Spangler, from her book <u>The Tender Words of God</u>, encountered a friend with an intriguing question: "If Jesus is God and God is love, why does Jesus sometimes seem not very nice in the Gospels?" It was a question she had asked herself more than once as she read through the Gospels. Oftentimes, Jesus' words "sounded anything but tender."

"Woe to you, because you are like unmarked graves, which men walk over without knowing it." Luke 11:44

"You snakes! You brood of vipers! How will you escape being condemned to hell?" Matthew 23:33

"You are like whitewashed tombs, which look beautiful on the outside but on the inside are full of dead men's bones and everything unclean." Matthew 23:27

"You belong to your father, the devil, and you want to carry out your father's desire. He was a murderer from the beginning." John 8:44

Perhaps part of the answer to her friend's question is that love is not always "nice," especially in the face of wickedness.

As she continued reading through Jesus' words in the Gospels, she was also reminded of how undiplomatic He could be. So often, when faced with the opportunity to say a word that would calm tensions and subdue tempers, Jesus said something that inflamed the situation, as though poking a stick into a beehive. It struck her that Jesus' harshest words were directed at people who needed skewering—the religious leaders of His day who resisted the Gospel and tried to influence ordinary people against Him. To be tender toward such men would be to turn His back on those He had come to save. It would be like looking on while someone held another person's head under water, depriving him of life.

So often, Jesus' words are as startling as they are challenging, words like:

"You have heard that it was said, Eye for eye, and tooth for tooth. But I tell you, Do not resist an evil person. If someone strikes you on the right cheek, turn to him the other also." Matthew 5:38-39

"It has been said, "Anyone who divorces his wife must give her a certificate of divorce. But I tell you that anyone who divorces his wife, except for marital unfaithfulness, causes her to become an adulteress, and anyone who marries the divorced woman commits adultery." Matthew 5:31-32

How could such words possibly be construed as tender, she wondered? The more she read, the more she began to realize that experiencing the tenderness of Jesus is often a matter of perspective. For instance, the passage exhorting us to love our enemies can seem like an impossible command. But it also reveals

the heart of Christ Himself, who when we were yet His enemies, treated us with the kind of extreme love that He commends to His followers.

But what about the passage concerning divorce? It would certainly have sounded harsh in the ears of a Jewish male. But to the ears of a Jewish woman, the words would have sounded sweet, because at that time a husband could divorce his wife for just about any reason, including a burnt dinner! As usual, Jesus was taking the side of the weak, of those who had no one to protect them.

Fortunately, her search through the Gospels uncovered many straightforward tender words—evidence of kindness to the sick, the weary, the outcast, the hungry, the poor and the demon-possessed. To anyone willing, He spoke words of encouragement and love. He was God walking in the creation He loved, touching, restoring, healing and imparting hope.

Even His actions and miracles are "words" to us, communicating God's profound love, telling us of His intention to restore and redeem us. The more she listened to the tender words of Jesus, identifying herself with the needy, the more she found herself relaxing, calming down, leaning into the words Jesus speaks to reshape the soul:

"Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest." Matthew 11:28

"Don't be afraid, you are worth more than many sparrows." Matthew 10:31

"My yoke is easy and my burden is light." Matthew 11:30

"Friend, your sins are forgiven." Luke 5:20

"Remain in my love." John 15:9

When someone asks you to tell a story, where do you begin? Anyway, my story includes my favorite scripture of all time, Proverbs 3:5, "Trust in the Lord ..." These four words were my mom's mantra. She said it every time she ended a conversation with me. After her passing I found myself saying the same to others. These words are action words. Yet, so easy to quote scripture when all is going well. However, they are powerful words too. And saying it and meaning it is the other story you and I don't always share or tell. But when the world turned topsy turvy around December 2019, I knew in my spirit that God had a plan and a vision way bigger than yours or mine, and for the next journey ahead.

Winter-Spring brought a lot of changes and challenges. Some of them were so subliminal while others were mountains that I could not climb alone. Our church, family, along with employment dynamics were beginning to be tested. For me, we had just purchased another home with the intention to move right away. That didn't happen as sickness and health was our season to trust God. Our adult children were thrown into different directions as some depended on us as parents, who suddenly moved their cheese. Oh, my goodness! Now, the Pandemic is here! People are dying all over the land! My thoughts were, "What in the world is going on?" "How are we, no, me, going to get through all of this?"

God's plan was too big, and I just love how He reveals himself to us, expected but not really expecting. All those obstacles, challenges and changes were growing me into the next spiritual awaking that was just for me. Yet He allowed me to go through to trust Him. I stayed in His word. He winterized me with His grace, love, forgiveness, and blessings. And, yes, mercies beyond any measure.

My sincere "newest" to giving thanks for all things in everything has another meaning, a spiritual deep dive. My trusting mantra became a heart-warming action, that no matter what, I will trust God.

Well, it's Spring again. We've all been through some things, some tests, and some challenges and even potentials. But just the sheer fact that I am here today, and you, too, are reading my story, is not by fate. God manifested healing – mind, body and soul. He loosened up division. He allowed me to continue to worship Him and to praise Him through Christ Jesus. He brought me through His plan, and I acknowledge there are more of His plans to come that I still cannot see. With my whole heart, I pray to always to put my trust in the Lord, my present, my forward.

Yes, seasons come, and seasons go. However, "As for me and my household, we will serve the Lord" (Joshua 24:15). Too, what I do know for real is, "...this is my story, this is my song, [trusting] my Savior, all the day long..." What's your story?






Sing a song full of faith that the dark past has taught us,
