

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THEME (cont'd)



SCRIPTURE OF THE MONTH



HYMN OF THE MONTH "What A Friend We Have In Jesus"



The hymn "What a Friend We Have in Jesus" was originally written as a poem in 1855 by Joseph M. Scriven to comfort his mother who was terribly ill and who was living in Ireland while he was in Canada. Scriven was born in 1819 of prosperous parents in Bainbridge, Down County, in Ireland. He graduated with a degree from Trinity College in Dublin in 1842. In 1843, the night before he was married, his fiancée accidentally drowned. In 1845, at the age of 25, he left his native Ireland and migrated to Canada. The poem was then titled, "Pray without Ceasing" and was published anonymously; it only received full credits in the 1880s.

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In 1868 Charles Crozat Converse composed a tune for it and William Bolcom composted the setting of the hymn. This hymn also has many versions with different lyrics in multiple languages. Scriven did not have any intentions nor dream that his poem would be for publication in the newspaper and later becoming a favorite hymn among the millions of Christians around the world. In 1857, in Port Hope, Ontario, Canada, he again fell in love and was due to be married, but in August 1860 his fiancée suddenly fell ill of pneumonia and died. He then devoted the rest of his life to tutoring, preaching and helping others.

On Friday, March 29, 2024, with Rev. Garfield Garner, presiding, seven associate ministers of Friendship Baptist Church presented an impressive scripturally supported 'sermonette' on the topic "The Last Seven Sayings of Jesus." Rev. Garner opened by giving a brief synopsis of the reason for the program and read Romans 10:14-15:

¹⁴ How then shall they call on him in whom they have not believed? and how shall they believe in him of whom they have not heard? and how shall they hear without a preacher?

¹⁵ And how shall they preach, except they be sent? as it is written, How beautiful are the feet of them that preach the gospel of peace, and bring glad tidings of good things!

The Praise Team then did a dynamic rendering of "Praise Him" before the speakers began. The speakers and a synopsis of their sermonette follows:

FIRST WORD - "Father, forgive them for they know not what they doeth" (Luke 23:34) *Rev. Stanley Jackson – Topic: Excruciating Forgiveness.* Rev. Jackson encouraged us to deeply reflect on the unimaginable pain on the cross as Jesus was betrayed, mocked and then crucified. He did not act in retaliation, but forgiveness.

In our relationships, look to forgive others, instead of showing bitterness. Choose love, show mercy, as well as receive mercy. Walk in Jesus' love and extend it to others. Forgiveness requires humility and courage. It is a conscious decision to free us from unforgiveness. Forgiveness is a required act that must be performed repeatedly. By choosing to forgive, we, the Believers, must begin with ourselves. Luke 23:24, Matthew 6:14-15, Psalm 103:12 all teach us that we must forgive. Colossians 3:13 tells us to forebear one another, endure and even support others. Ephesians 4:32 teaches us to be kind and tenderhearted! Jesus' birth, death, resurrection and even salvation all happened so that we would be equipped to do so.

SECOND WORD - "Jesus said unto him, verily I say unto thee, today shalt thou be with me in paradise" (Luke 23:43)

Min. Monique Stroman – Topic: Remember Me. Min. Stroman began by telling us that Jesus was misunderstood by many of the people. He was falsely accused, but made no reply, had not complained. He did not open His mouth.

Adam and Eve sinned: God had a plan to save humankind again. Jesus, the sinless man was the only One who could bring God's plan into reality. Do not try to please the crowd. Do not give in to the pressures of man. For God's plans always win. Recognize that Jesus was totally innocent and willing to save others?

The Last Seven Sayings of Jesus (cont'd)

He promises to be with us, and we can be with Him in Paradise! Jesus is love and grace. He intercedes for all who accept Him as Savior (Romans 8:34). Remember: Jesus loves each of us.

THIRD WORD - "When Jesus saw his mother and the disciple whom he loved standing near, he said to his mother, woman, behold thy Son. Then he said to the disciple, behold your mother" (John 19:26)

Rev. Eugene Graves – Topic: Don't Forget Your Family. Rev. Graves reminded us that Jesus' love prevailed for His mother, even while He was in total agony on the cross. She would be remembered as that mother of that crucified one called Jesus.

We should learn that love for parents and family is especially important. We are not absolved from familial responsibilities and obligations.

FOURTH WORD - "My God, My God, why hast thou forsaken me" (Matthew 27:46)

Rev. Alton Wilson – Topic: Total Access. Rev. Wilson began by asking a question: "What do the events around Jesus' death mean to us?" Secondly, he asked three more questions: (1) why did an earthquake occur during the crucifixion; (2) why was the veil in the temple torn into; and (3) why did Father God forsake His sinless Son in a bruising death? Rev. Wilson elaborated on each question: God could not sin; He did not look on His Son as He took on all the sins of this world. Jesus was separated from His Father.

Christ's Holy Blood was sacrificed for us. God does not tolerate sin. Jesus made the ultimate sacrifices for us to be able to reach the Father through Jesus, and boldly so!

FIFTH WORD - "Jesus knowing that all things were now accomplished that the scriptures might be fulfilled said, I thirst" (John 19:28)

Rev. Garfield Garner – Topic: I Thirst! Jesus does not do anything by happenstance. He knew while he was at this well that He would encounter a woman who had a bad reputation or no righteousness, drawing water at high noon when no other women would be there as they would gather in the cool of the morning to draw water. This wicked woman had five husbands and the one she was with was not her husband. Jesus asked for a drink of water but she was reluctant and made excuses. Jesus told her that the water He would give her would well up in her as everlasting life. Many people were saved by this encounter.

Rev. Garner emphasized that Jesus always has a purpose regardless of what sin we commit. Jesus is righteous and He never fails. We were urged to thirst for righteousness.

SIXTH WORD (Part 1) - "He said, It is finished" (John 19:30)

Rev. Larry Jones – Topic: It is Finished! Rev. Jones emphasized that all of God's plan for Jesus was that He was born to die. No matter what language is used to describe the assignment, it all added up to the debt was paid in full, and in complete submission. Rev. Jones asked why was Jesus on the cross? He went on to explain that the journey had all started in the Garden of Eden with the fall of humankind. Jesus was the only one capable of bearing all of our sins. No other humankind could do it. <u>The ultimate plan: Jesus is born to die on the cross.</u>

There were three items brought by the Wise Men to visit the newborn child. They brought frankincense for priestly usage, gold represented royalty, and myrrh was used to anoint the dead.

The Last Seven Sayings of Jesus (cont'd)

Jesus made the ultimate sacrifice for all of us (John 3:16). We must all go through Jesus to get to God. Salvation comes through Jesus for all our needs. Jesus had a purpose; He was called and performed as His Father directed Him.

SIXTH WORD (Part 2) - "It is finished" (John 19:30) and Mark 15:37 "With a loud cry, Jesus breathed His last breath."

Rev. Shurron Green – Topic: Jesus said "It is Finished! Rev. Green emphasized that Jesus knew His purpose for the words He spoke. Jesus' last words have power, deep meaning and significance. Jesus knew what His final words needed to be and He had a great purpose for saying all of those seven words as He hung on the cross.

Rev. Green reflected on the importance of the last words of anyone. Even in our time as we live today, when someone utters their last words, it holds a great significance. Jesus became the final and ultimate sacrifice for our sins. Jesus came to finish God's work. The work of salvation in each and every one of us. He came to pay our sin debt in full. It is finished on the cross, and yet His work is finished also, His sinless blood shed for all of our debt has paid it all in full!


SEVENTH WORD - "Father into thy hands I commend my spirit" (Luke 23:46)

Rev. Artis Johnson – Topic: Don't Give Up, Give In. A few of the names we know Jesus by are: The Bread of Life, Light of the World, Resurection and the Life; even included are True Vine and Master Teacher. Now Jesus is being crucified at the demand of Pilate. All of mankind's sins are now on Jesus. His father could not look at His Son due to all the sins of men then, and even now. How much does Jesus have to take? His crucifixion was more terrible than any Hollywood depiction may try to show. Jesus was beaten all night. He was tortured so intently that it could not be described. He was mocked, spat on, experienced indescribable pain. He even sweated blood in the Garden because He knew the pain He would endure. The whips used were so indescribably painful; but Jesus endured it all.

Good Friday was not always good, Rev. Johnson explained. Jesus was nailed to an old rugged cross, and He suffered, but He now asks God, His Father, to forgive those who were torturing Him. Now He has the victory! And in all His suffering, Jesus did what He had to do – He died.

We are charged to take up our cross daily. But because of the grace of Jesus, we can do what God wants us to do. We wish for "if I had," but Jesus is trying to teach us to place ourselves in His Hands, whether we are broken, addicted, rejected, etc. Take one more step! Trust God. Don't Give Up!

Pastor Ronald Bowens gave the closing remarks and extended his hand beckoning those who have not yet accepted Jesus as their Lord and Savior to come. He said we are all recipients of God's blessings.

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The Usher's Anniversary Service was incorporated into the 11:00 a.m. morning worship service on Sunday, March 24, 2024. FBC celebrated the following four women in March during Women's History Month for their outstanding accomplishments and for making a positive impact today. We salute them!



A resident of Peachtree Corners for over 25 years, Ora B. Douglass was elected as the first African-American female Councilwoman in November 2023.

Ora B. Douglass was born at Atlanta's Grady Hospital, but was raised in Fort Pierce, Florida. Orphaned at 18 months, she has worked hard for her accomplishments and knows the importance of a good education, perseverance, dedication, and service to all mankind.

She earned her Bachelor of Science degree in nursing from **Florida A&M University** and earned a Master of Nursing Administration degree from **Emory University**. After graduating nursing

school, Douglass was commissioned an officer in the **U.S. Army Nurse Corps**.

A veteran with over 13 years of service, she has been stationed in Hawaii and was part of the **U.S. Army Reserves.** Ora is a retired Registered Nurse and was a veteran commissioned officer of the U.S. Army Nurse Corps.

She has worked at numerous hospitals in the Atlanta area. She served as Director of Community Home Based Nursing at the Veterans Administration Medical Center in Atlanta, Georgia.

Ora is dedicated to and passionate about community service. In 2014, Ora led a group of members in chartering the Psi Omega Omega chapter of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority Inc. chapter in Peachtree Corners, Georgia, where she served as President. In 2016, she established The Georgia Pearls of Service (GPOS) Foundation in Peachtree Corners, where she currently serves as the group's President.

Mrs. Douglass also serves on the Board of the Robert D. Fowler YMCA and is a member of the Peachtree Corners Rotary Club. Mrs. Douglass and her husband, Adrian, have four children and three grandchildren and are members of Friendship Baptist Church in Duluth.

Dr. Morrow is a member of the Alpha Alpha Pi Omega Chapter of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Incorporated and has been a member since 1998. Additionally, she served as the President of the Undergraduate Lambda Kappa Chapter of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc.

The first in her family to receive her doctoral degree, Dr. Morrow went from a child who attended school every day to an adult aspiring to capture an educational degree at every level. She is dedicated to the education of all children and has served as an educator in Gwinnett County for 23 years. Dr. Morrow was the first black Teacher of the Year at Shiloh Elementary School in 2010. Prior to being appointed Principal at Kanoheda Elementary school, she served as an Assistant Principal at two schools for a total of 8 years. Dr. Morrow together with her staff and students celebrated being recognized as a "Distinguished" PBIS (Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports) School by the State of Georgia for two consecutive years.

Dr. Morrow has been a member of Friendship Baptist Church since 2004. She and husband, Deacon Tyrone Morrow, are the parents of Ty'Asia, Leila and Aiden Morrow.



Leslie Clark is a wife, mother, engineer, entrepreneur, and author. She was born in San Bernardino, California, but spent the majority of her childhood, along with her two siblings, in Bradenton, Florida, where she ultimately calls home. Mrs. Clark currently resides in Buford, Georgia.

Leslie received her undergraduate degree from Florida State University where she majored in Environmental Engineering. Additionally, she received her Master of Engineering from the University of Florida.

Mrs. Clark is currently employed as a Sr. Sustainability Program Manager for Amazon. However, she has always wanted to be an entrepreneur. During the Pandemic lock down in 2020, she decided to turn her love of reading into actual writing and publishing her own books.

A people without the knowledge of their past history, origin and culture is like a tree without roots.

Attributed to Marcus Garvey

Annie was an American businesswoman, inventor, and entrepreneur. In the early part of the 20th Century, she founded and developed a large prominent commercial and educational enterprise that focused on cosmetics for African-American woman. There are debates that she was the first African American woman to become a millionaire.

Annie was born on August 9, 1877, in Metropolis IL, which is about 350 miles south of Chicago. Her parents, Robert and Isabella, were former slaves. Annie's father, Robert, fought for the Union in the 1st Kentucky Calvary while her mother


escaped by following the Ohio river to Metropolis IL, the tenth child out of eleven. Unfortunately, Annie was orphaned at an early age when both her parents died.

Annie's early education was in Metropolis, and she moved to Peoria to live with her older sister Ava Moody. She attended high school in Peoria. While in high school Annie had an interest in chemistry but due to multiple illnesses, she had to drop out of school. While out of school, Annie became interested in hair dressing and hair care products. She would often practice hair dressing on her sister. With a chemistry background and an interest in hair care products, she began developing her own hair products, with a focus on the scalp and damaged hair.

In 1900, Annie moved to Lovejoy, IL and it is here that she started to experiment with hair care products she

was creating. She wanted to produce products that would help strengthen the hair and repair damaged hair. During this time women would use goose fats, heavy oils, or bacon grease to straighten their hair. Annie's product was made of special oils and hair stimulants and called The Wonderful Hair Grower. Annie sold her product door to door. It was one of the first products that would revolutionize hair care products for African American women.

When Annie's business started to thrive, she moved to St. Louis, MO in 1902. At this time, it was her and three other employees selling her products door to door. With the high demand for her products, Annie decided to open a standalone store in St. Louis on Market Street. She began a big marketing and advertising program in the black




neighborhoods, and she hired more agents to sell her products. One of those agents was Sarah Breedlove Davis aka Madam CJ Walker. Sarah started working for Annie in 1906.


Due to the success Annie's products had at the World's Fair, another larger location was opened on Pine Street.

When a disagreement happened between Annie and Sarah, Annie created the company Poro and began to copyright her products. This was to prevent fraudulent imitations and to discourage counterfeit versions of her products, both hair care products and skin care products.



fam Pope Turnbo Malone, the manufacturer of the celebrated Poro Hair Goods, was in the city last week June 19th, in the interest of her work and held meetings with her agents at C. M. E. church on Monday night and Sixth Avenue church on Tuesday night. She gave a stereoscopical lecture during these meetings. The pictures shown were posed from real life, especially for Madam Malone. Her audience were delighted with the lecture. Madam Malone is one of the distinguished women of our race, possessing rare business qualities. She has done much for Philanthropic work throughout the state of Missouri. The proceeds were donated to the churches in which she spoke

Poro reported assets of \$14 million in 1920, making Malone arguably the first recorded female African American millionaire. Adjusting for inflation, her fortune would be worth \$186 million in today's dollars, Turnbo not only rode this wave — at its height, the company's sales amounted to almost \$37 million in today's dollars and employed 75,000 women around the world — but she fueled it as well.



Although Annie and Sarah were competitors, both were successful businesswoman, and both hired more African American woman in the early 20th Century than any other company. Their philanthropy is what lives decades after their deaths.

In 1918, Annie established Poro College, a cosmetology school and center. The building included a manufacturing plant, a retail store where Poro products were sold, business offices, a 500-seat auditorium, dining and meeting rooms, a roof garden, dormitory, gymnasium, bakery, and chapel. It served the African American community as a center for religious and social functions. She gave thousands of dollars to the local black YMCA and the Howard University College of Medicine in Washington, D.C.

She became a benefactor of the St. Louis Colored Orphans Home, where she served as president on the board of directors from 1919 to 1943. With her help, in 1922 the Home bought a facility at 2612 Goode Avenue, which was renamed Annie Malone Drive in her honor. The Orphans Home is in the historic Ville neighborhood. Upgraded and expanded, the facility was renamed in the entrepreneur's honor as the Annie Malone Children and Family Service Center as well as funding many programs.

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FBC OUTREACH MINISTRY ATLANTA COMMUNITY FOOD BANK HUNGER WALK/RUN

In Georgia, 1 in 8 children and 1 in 13 seniors do not have access to enough food and certainly not enough nutritionally adequate food – in other words, these people are food insecure. For over 14 years, Friendship Baptist Church through its Outreach Ministry has helped to address this situation. In the past five years, the Outreach Ministry increased its efforts to help address food insecurity in Georgia by becoming an agency partner with the Atlanta Community Food Bank. Being an agency partner allows FBC to purchase food at a substantially reduced cost from the Atlanta Community Food Bank which, in turn, reduces the amount that FBC invests in the Friendship Market.

The annual Hunger Walk Run is a fundraising event hosted by the ACFB in conjunction with other sponsors to raise both awareness of food insecurity and to provide funds to enable the ACFB to purchase food from wholesalers at significantly reduced prices. ACFB stocks its warehouses with food purchased from suppliers and some donated food. Agencies that participate in the Hunger Walk/Run receive a matching credit for each dollar raised to purchase food at the ACFB.

The FBC Outreach Ministry first participated in the Hunger Walk/Run in March 2023 and raised \$10,375.00. In March 2024, our goal was \$15,000.00. With the overwhelming and generous support of our FBC members, family, friends, businesses, coworkers, and colleagues, we raised **\$19,340.00**. With these funds we will be able to increase the amount of food we distribute and serve more households. We could not have reached and



surpassed our goal without our donors understanding and appreciating the urgency to address food insecurity in our community. We extend our thanks to everyone, and we are grateful for your continued support.


