




African American Quarterbacks and the NFL

As the new NFL season begins, I'm excited for my Pittsburgh Steelers, I guess every team's fans feel they have an opportunity to win the Super Bowl this year. As my friends and I debate who our starting quarterback will be, it is brought to my attention that we have an African American coach deciding which African American quarterback will start for his team. While I take this for granted, the generation before me reminds me how infrequently this was just 25 years ago. The Atlanta Falcons' 1st African American starting quarterback was Michael Vick in 2001. Of the 32 teams in the NFL, 15 teams will have an African American quarterback starting for their team. This is the most in NFL history.

It was once thought that African American football players did not have the intelligence to be quarterbacks, they were just athletic and would not be able to make the decisions (this is before coaches could talk to quarterbacks through their helmets) without calling a timeout and getting the play from the coaches. The desegregation of the quarterback position in the NFL took place in 1968 with Marlin Briscoe of the Denver Broncos.



Briscoe played quarterback at Omaha University from 1963-1967 and had a record of 27-11 as their starting quarterback. When the Broncos drafted Marlin, thev intended convert him to a cornerback, which is a defensive position. While at Omaha, Briscoe set 22 records, including a passing 55% percentage, 4,935 passing yards, 52 touchdown passes, and 6,253 total offensive yards.

On September 29, 1968, the starting quarterback for the Broncos was injured with a broken collarbone, and the 2nd string quarterback was spotty. Lou Saban, the coach at the time, put Briscoe in as the quarterback. Even though the Broncos lost to the Patriots, Briscoe had 43 passing yards and 51 rushing yards with 1 touchdown pass. The final score of the game was 20-17. Martin was the starting quarterback for the Broncos for the remainder of the season, with a record of 5 wins and 6 losses.


HIGHLIGHTING BLACK HISTORY

As the 1968 season was to begin, the Broncos wanted Briscoe to play wide receiver, but he was determined to play quarterback and asked to be traded. He was traded to the Buffalo Bills. The Bills had Marlin playing wide receiver because the team had 3 superstar quarterbacks, including African American quarterback, James Harris.

Nevertheless, Briscoe not only desegregated the starting quarterback position, but he also dispelled the stereotype of African American football players. Following Martin Briscoe, we've had Doug Williams, Russell Wilson, and Patrick Mahomes win Super Bowls. Rodney Peete, Randall Cunningham, and Warren Moon showed us they can do more than run for yards. Jalen Hurts, C.J. Stroud and Jordan Love have led legendary football teams to the playoffs. Briscoe was a true trailblazer for the legacy of African American quarterbacks.
