The Resurrection of Jesus

Jesus was beaten and mocked as He took on our sins, burdens, shames, and disgraces with His body. He died, giving His life as a living sacrifice to redeem us from our wretchedness and wicked ways. He rose again on the third day to give us hope for a new life in Christ, a rebirth of man's soul in His new covenant by His Blood.

By rising from the dead, Jesus Christ demonstrated that He had cleansed the guilt of our past and was able to help us in our present lives. His resurrection assures us that our future is safe and secure in Him. Now after He had risen early on the first day of the week, He first appeared to Mary Magdalene, from whom He had cast out seven demons.





"The heavens declare the glory of God; the skies proclaim the work of his hands." – Psalm 19:1



A Reminder of Our Black History

As we celebrate Black History, it is important to remember the contributions of African American inventors that occur daily in our routines.



As you get dressed for the day, remember to thank George Carver for laundry soap. Although he is famous for inventing peanut butter, Carver, used peanuts create many products such as hand lotion. rubbing oil. mayonnaise, Worcestershire sauce.

and more than 200 others.




When cook you breakfast, thank John Standard for his refrigerator and stove improvements. He created a separate ice chamber with air ducts to circulate cold air. His 1889 oil stove was a space-saving design, ideal for buffet-style meals on trains.





Garrett Morgan invented a manually operated traffic signal with moving arms displaying "stop" and "go" signs, which could placed on a post at traffic intersections. The arms could also be raised halfway to indicate caution. A traffic attendant would turn the crank to operate the signal, and all lanes could be stopped showing "stop" if necessary.



The automation of closina elevator doors can be attributed to Alexander Miles. Before this invention, elevator doors were closed manually and were not always fully closed, leading to numerous injuries.

A REMINDER OF OUR BLACK HISTORY



At work, you likely use a computer. Mark E. Dean, a co-creator of the ISA bus and leader of the team that invented the one-gigahertz computer processor chip, contributed to advancements in measuring computer processing speed.

If you set the alarm in your house, thank Mary Van Brown. Her invention included an electrically controlled lock, peepholes with covers, camera, sliding motors, loudspeaker, microphone, and associated electronics. The camera moved to each peephole, uncovering them as it went, and transmitted images to a TV monitor inside the home. This setup allowed occupants to see and communicate with visitors without opening the door. Push buttons on a control panel could remotely control the camera and lock via radio signals.

Since the arrival of the first Africans in America, we have significantly contributed to advancements in technology, communication, medicine, development, and other fields.

"Dear brothers and sisters, be patient as you wait for the Lord's return. Consider the farmers who patiently wait for the rains in the fall and in the spring. They eagerly look for the valuable harvest to ripen."

- James 5:7 {NLT}"

"You, too, must be patient. Take courage, for the coming of the Lord is near." - James 5:8 {NLT}


