HIGHLIGHTING BLACK HISTORY



FBC and the Enduring Legacy of the **Black Church**

This article highlights the history of FBC Duluth and provides a glimpse of the history of the Black Church as a whole.

Friendship Baptist Church (FBC) will celebrate its 77th Anniversary on May 28, 2025. Under the steady leadership of Pastor Ronald L. Bowens, it stands as a living testament to the enduring legacy and cultural significance of the Black Church in America. Founded in 1948, FBC has grown from humble beginnings to become a vital source of spiritual and community support in Gwinnett County.

At FBC's 76th Anniversary service held on May 26, 2024, Sister Cynthia Urquhart shared a powerful retelling of the church's dynamic history, drawing from the memories and insights of various church members. What follows are key highlights from the presentation. The complete presentation available on the FBC website.

The Founding and Early Years (1948–1978)

Founded in 1948 under the visionary leadership of Reverend P.J. Dodson and Moderator Dr. C.N. Ellis, FBC began with fewer than 25 faithful members. During its first three decades, The Heritage House (now the Heritage Church) was constructed, and the building was fully paid for.

A Time of Expansion (1978–1988)

period from 1978 to 1988 tremendous growth with the formation of the Deacon Board, Sunday School, and Church Choir. Membership expanded dramatically growing from under 25 members to over 1,200. In 1984, Pastor Ronald L. Bowens was installed as Pastor.

A New Era: Services, Structure, and Sanctuary Plans (1989-1999)

FBC adopted a distinctive worship rhythm: morning services on the 2nd and 4th Sundays, and evening services at 8 p.m. on the 1st, 3rd, and 5th Sundays. In 1995, the church officially incorporated and received its 501(c)(3)nonprofit status. In 1998, FBC celebrated 50 years of ministry, launching a building fund calendar drive in anticipation of a sanctuary.

A New Sanctuary and Global Reach (2000-2010)

The new millennium marked another major transformation with a wave of new members including many from State Farm Insurance. The Children's Church and the New Members Ministry were introduced. On April 27, 2003, the last service was held in the Heritage House. One week later, on May 4, the congregation marched joyfully into a new sanctuary.

In 2010, FBC expanded its missionary outreach, as Pastor Bowens and several church members traveled to Monrovia, Liberia, furthering the church's global impact. That same year marked the passing of beloved founding member Mother Lena Blake, who lived to the age of 106.

Spiritual Growth and Education (2011–2021)

As the congregation expanded, FBC began construction on its Family Life Center to accommodate more classes and activities. The church began offering courses on seminary

studies. worship. discipleship, marriage, forgiveness, and more. In 2016, Reverend Stanley Williams and Minister Barbara Williams began leading the Youth Church Service, helping build a foundation for the next generation of believers. In March 2020, FBC, like churches across the world, faced the global COVID-19 pandemic. But instead of shutting down, the church adapted. Through livestreamed services on YouTube, Pastor Bowens - supported by the Deacons, Praise Team, and Communications Ministry continued to minister. As Sister Cynthia Urquhart expressed during FBC's 76th Anniversary service, "what was meant to shut us down literally opened us up to the world..." (Urquhart, 2024).

Continuing the Mission (2022-Present)

Today, FBC continues to uphold its mission to "exalt the Savior, equip the saints, and evangelize the sinner" through a diverse range of ministries, spiritual education classes, and community outreach programs. Some of the most notable outreach efforts include initiatives such as the Friendship Market, which offers food assistance to those in need; collaborations with the Atlanta Community Food Bank's Hunger Walk Run 5k event aimed at combating hunger; and volunteer outreach supporting individuals homelessness experiencing through organizations such as Rainbow Village.



The Broader Context: The Legacy of the Black Church

FBC has a rich and significant history, yet it is essential to recognize that this history is part of a much larger story in American history—the story of the Black church, which traces its origins back to the era of slavery, when enslaved Africans began blending their spiritual traditions with Christianity. During a time when enslavers often tried to control or suppress their worship, slaves found ways to gather and practice their faith in secret, creating what became known as the "invisible institution." "Through signals, passwords, and messages not discernible to whites, they [slaves] called believers to 'hush harbors' where they freely mixed African rhythms, singing, and beliefs with evangelical Christianity" (Maffly-Kipp, 2001).

In the early 1800s, Black communities started forming their own independent church denominations. Richard Allen's African Methodist Episcopal (AME) Church, founded in 1816, was born out of his frustration with segregated churches and racial tension (National Archives, 2021). Other institutions like the AME Zion Church and the National Baptist Convention followed. These churches weren't just about worship – they also became anchors for learning, activism, and community support.

After the Civil War and during Reconstruction and Jim Crow, the Black Church began to have a significant influence on African American education. Primarily across the south, several colleges now known as Historically Colleges and Universities (HBCUs), were established Black ministers white by and philanthropists to educate freed slaves (Freemark, 2015).

During the Civil Rights Movement, the Black Church served as a powerful agent for social change. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., the Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC), and pastors across the nation used their ministries not just to deliver sermons and preach The Word, but to inspire action—igniting protests, sit-ins, and marches nationwide (Southern Christian Leadership Conference [SCLC], 1957.)

Still Standing

As Donnie McClurkin so movingly sings in "Stand" – "What do you do when you've done all you can?" – the answer is: "You just stand." For 77 years, in the face of adversity and growth, in times of celebration and loss, Friendship Baptist Church (along with many other black churches) has stood and is still standing – by the grace of God!

Biblical Battle-Dress

"Endure suffering along with me, as a good soldier of Christ Jesus. Soldiers don't get tied up in the affairs of civilian life, for then they cannot please the officer who enlisted them." -2 Timothy 2:3-4 (NLT)

Did you know that May is National Military Appreciation Month? Throughout May of every year, we observe a month-long celebration to honor those who sacrifice for our country's freedoms. In 2 Timothy, the Apostle Paul instructs us not to get caught up in worldly affairs and to be good soldiers of Christ Jesus. But what exactly does it mean to be a "good soldier?" What does that look like?

For starters, before setting foot on any battlefield, a good soldier must be dressed properly. He or she must also have the proper equipment if they are going to endure suffering and "please the officer [Christ] who enlisted them." (2 Tim. 2:4 NLT) We can look to Ephesians 6:13-17 (NLT) to see Paul's list of a good soldier's dress code and equipment.

- 1. BELT of Truth- to gird up your waist with what is honest and true.
- 2. BREASTPLATE of Righteousness- to guard your heart, for everything you do flows from it (Prov. 4:23 NIV).
- 3.**SHOES of Peace** because blessed are the peacemakers! (Matt. 5:9 NIV) These will help you travel far and wide with the Gospel of peace.
- 4. **SHIELD of Faith** to shield you from the enemy's fiery darts. He seeks to kill, steal, and destroy (John 10:10 NIV).
- 5. **HELMET of Salvation** which protects your mind from fear, doubt, and worldliness. We are to be transformed by the renewing of our minds (Rom. 12:2 NIV).
- 6.**SWORD of the Spirit** which is the Word of God. Truly, it is sharper than any two-edged sword! (Heb. 4:12 NIV)
