

THEME OF THE MONTH

Trust

Trust” can be interpreted in many ways, but all interpretations have the same basic principles regarding morals and ethics. “Trust”, in the English language, is a noun which means: the firm belief in the reliability, truth, ability or strength of someone or something. The verb or action word of “trust” is the same as having faith in, putting or placing one’s trust in, having confidence in, or believing in someone or something. When it comes to the Law, “trust” is having an arrangement whereby a person called a “trustee” holds property as its nominal owner for the good of one or more beneficiaries. In the olden days, “trust” also involved extending credit to someone and allowing them to make the payment at a later time.

The Biblical definition of “trust” is to believe in the reliability, truth or strength of someone or something - in this case, God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit. Relationships have to be built on trust. When it comes to trusting God, we must believe in His reliability, His Word and His ability and His strength. We can solely trust in God because He does not lie, He keeps His promises, He loves us unconditionally, He protects us, takes care of us, and defends us. To trust in God means



more than believing in who He is and what He says. We have to have confidence in Him. Having confidence in someone or something means having an assurance that leads to action.

Is trust considered a choice or a feeling? Being aware of all the qualities that trust entails and giving people the chance to demonstrate them can provide useful information about whether to trust someone or not. When people decide to take that leap, they do so purposefully and intentionally. In that case we can say “trust” is a considered choice.

Proverbs 3:5-6 says, “Trust in the Lord with all thine heart, and lean not to your own understanding. In all thy ways acknowledge Him and He shall direct your paths.” (KJV)

Jesus symbolizes trust as we see in Mark 5:36 in the synagogue when he told Jairus, “Don’t be afraid, only believe.” (KJV)

God is trustworthy, faithful, reliable and He calls his people to respond to His trustworthiness with trust.

HIGHLIGHTING BLACK HISTORY

African Americans and Labor Day:

The Struggle, Sacrifice, and Legacy

Honoring Contributions and Confronting Historical Challenges

Labor Day, celebrated on the first Monday in September, is often marked by parades, barbecues, and rest. Yet beyond the festivities lies a deeper story: one of struggle, solidarity, and the ongoing pursuit of justice in the American workplace. For African Americans, the holiday reflects both progress and exclusion, woven with resilience and hope.

Proposed in the 1880s and signed into law in 1894 after the Pullman Strike, Labor Day was meant to honor American workers. But African Americans—barred from many unions and denied fair wages—were largely left out. Still, Black leaders played pivotal roles in shaping labor’s future.

A. Philip Randolph, founder of the Brotherhood of Sleeping Car Porters in 1925, led the first predominantly Black union recognized by the American Federation of Labor. His organizing stretched beyond wages: in 1941, his threatened march on Washington compelled President Franklin D. Roosevelt to ban discrimination in defense industries. That same vision echoed in the 1963 March on Washington for Jobs and Freedom, where Randolph stood beside Martin Luther King Jr.

Even as Labor Day parades remained segregated, Black communities created their own



celebrations, blending labor and pride with cultural traditions of music, food, and fellowship. Meanwhile, Black workers fueled the Great Migration, joining unions in northern and western cities and expanding the movement’s reach.

Today, African American workers remain at the forefront of labor activism. From the Fight for \$15 to leadership by Black women in unions and worker alliances, their efforts confront disparities in pay, opportunity, and representation. The COVID-19 pandemic further underscored these inequities, as Black essential workers carried disproportionate risks.

The story of African Americans and Labor Day is one of perseverance amid adversity. It is a reminder that equality in the workplace is not guaranteed—but must be fought for until solidarity and prosperity are shared by all.




Fall is a time of transition, as nature prepares for the cold embrace of winter.


Psalms 104:19 "He made the moon to mark the seasons, and the sun knows when to go down."

Often called fall in the United States because leaves fall from the trees at that time. Fall teaches us the importance of releasing what no longer serves us. It is a season of shedding old patterns, beliefs, and emotions that weigh us down.

Fall invites us to reflect on the year that has passed and express gratitude for the blessings we have received. It is a time to pause, slow down, and appreciate the beauty that surrounds us; embracing it can lead to personal growth and spiritual evolution.

Fall is connected with the harvesting of crops; in



many cultures autumn, like the other seasons, has been marked by rites and festivals revolving around the season's importance in food production. Animals gather food in autumn in preparation for the coming winter, and those with fur often grow thicker coats.

Genesis 8:22 "As long as the earth endures, seedtime and harvest, cold and heat, summer and winter, day and night will never cease."

Fall, with its inherent sense of transition and change, offers a unique opportunity for introspection and growth; it's also an ideal time to engage in journaling and self-reflection.

Autumn is usually defined in the Northern Hemisphere as the period between the autumnal equinox (day and night equal in length), September 22 or 23, and the winter solstice (year's shortest day), December 21 or 22.

The benefits of this intergenerational relationship, such as improved longevity for grandparents and emotional resilience for grandchildren, are well-documented in research. Celebrating this day




